## BERGER CONTINUES TO BE FINED IN POLICE COURT

MAYOR PRO TEM MAURA ASSESSED A FINE OF \$125 AGAINST HIM YESTERDAY, BUT DEFENDANT GAVE BOND FOR A NEW TRIAL. OTHER DEFENDANTS ARE DISCHARGED.

C. S. Berger, manager of the Carnival Company, was again a defendant in the police court yesterday morning. He was also again fined, the amount assessed against him being \$125 for doing business without a license. In addition fines aggregating \$12.50 were assessed for fighting, assaulting and cursing members of Wyer's Band.

The case occupied considerable time in the court, which was presided over by Mayor Pro Tem Maura, and the incidents enacted during the trial were interesting to many spectators who attended the court. Mr. Berger was first arraigned upon the charges preferred against him for fighting, assaulting and cursing, and small fines assessed.

Chas. M. Coston represented him as attorney, but owing to the manner in which Mr. Berger conducted himself, Mr. Coston withdrew from the case, notifying the mayor pro tem that he did not care any longer to represent the defendant.

The case for doing business without a license was afterwards called, and the defendant was assessed a fine of \$125, the mayor pro tem holding that each attraction in operation the day previous was doing business without the proper license. The various attractions were subject to the payment of a license tax of \$25 each, according to this decision, inasmuch as each was charging a separate admission.

The managers of each of the shows were also arraigned, but these cases were not pressed. The license under which the shows were operating was that granted upon petition, and was secured from the tax collector upon payment of \$25.00.

Mr. Berger gave notice that he would apply for a new trial and gave the required bond for his appearance at the time it is to be decided.

These targets are now all completed and ready for use.

At present the artillerymen are engaged in subliminal practice, which will continue until the 15th.

The Bouy has received a letter from Hon. W. B. ## URGES FLORIDA SHIP CANAL

COL. S. A. JONES VIGOROUSLY AGITATING THE SUBJECT.

SOME FACTS AND FIGURES.

A recent issue of the Tampa Times contained the following:

The Times is in receipt of a copy of the Asheville (N. C.) Citizen containing a lengthy and impressive article by Col. S. A. Jones in advocacy of the construction of a ship canal across Florida. The Citizen comments editorially on the article as follows:

"We present to our readers to-day a very thoughtful and interesting article by S. A. Jones, formerly of Florida, now a resident of Waynesville, on the vast benefits that the country would derive from a Florida ship canal.

"If the figures presented by him are true, and we presume they are, the matter is deserving of the highest consideration on the part of the people, not only of the south, but of the whole United States.

"Mr. Jones is entirely familiar with the subject of canals, he having served for a number of years on the national committee for the promotion and building of a Nicaragua canal.

"Mr. Jones states that a canal across upper Florida would cost only about \$20,000,000 and would reclaim 4,000,000 acres of rich sugar lands, now more or less under water, upon which could be produced sixteen billion pounds of cane sugar, or more than four times the annual sugar consumption in the United States, now costing the consumers nearly \$200,000,000 per annum.

"If the half of Mr. Jones's surmises are true the benefits flowing from the construction of this canal will still be so enormous that its first cost, in contrast, becomes a matter of supreme insignificance.

"The figures presented in the article open up a vast field for speculation and justify most careful consideration."

HAND OF MACHINIST INJURED AT NAVY YARD.

Fell, a machinist in charge of the department of steam engineering, met with a painful accident yesterday at the navy yard by having two fingers of the right hand crushed so badly that amputation of part of them may be necessary.
