MAYOR T. E. WELLES IS NOT A CANDIDATE

IMPOSSIBLE FOR HIM TO SERVE ANOTHER TERM ON ACCOUNT OF VARIOUS BUSINESS INTERESTS.

Mayor Welles will not be a candidate for mayor in the coming election. He so stated last night to a Journal reporter. This ends much of the talk which has been circulated during the past few weeks that the mayor would again aspire to the position which he now holds. In fact, it has been the prevailing opinion that he would be a candidate and his friends were in hopes that he would

shortly announce and live up the campaign. When seen last night by a Journal reporter and asked if he would be a candidate, the mayor said: "I will not be a candidate for mayor. My business interests are such that it would be impossible for me to perform the duties incumbent upon the mayor for another term. I have been requested by many citizens to become an aspirant for the office again, and have also had numerous petitions sent to me, all requesting that I announce. I feel highly honored to know that so many of my fellow citizens have such a feeling for me, but under no circumstances can I grant their request and again become a candidate."

BOARD OF SAFETY HELD MEETING LAST NIGHT

WHEN THE RESIGNATION OF THREE POLICE WERE TENDERED AND ACCEPTED—MANY APPLICATIONS WERE RECEIVED.

A session of the Board of Public Safety was held last night, Chairman White presiding, with Mayor Welles, Mr. Johnson and Mr. Gonzalez present.

The first matter to come up was the report of the chief of the fire department. He stated that the loss from fires during the past month had amounted to \$1,240.20, covered by insurance of \$2,000 or more.

The chief also reported that a number of the hydrants on Palafox street were in bad condition, and that should those be attached it would likely cause the caps to blow off. The water company, however, had given notice that new caps had been ordered and would be placed as soon as they arrived.

Marshal Schad reported that there had been 397 arrests during the past month. Of this number 333 had been convicted, and 46 discharged. Thirteen defendants had been sent to the criminal court. Fines imposed amounted to \$1,302.50, while collections aggregated \$851.00.

A petition was read from citizens residing in the vicinity of Frascati, asking that a water main be placed at the corner of Gregory street and Thirteenth avenue, and also that additional lights be provided. The petition was referred to Mr. Gonzalez and Chief White for investigation.

The Fisher Real Estate Agency gave notice that after April 1st, it would no longer lease the property now used as a pound lot by the city. The marshal was instructed to secure a location.

A communication asking that an officer be compelled to pay a debt contracted, was returned, the board notifying the holder that it was not a collecting agency.

The resignations of Police Officers Mike Puhtell, J. A. Colvin and Chas. D. Villar were read and accepted.

Applications for positions in the police department were read from Geo. Parker and Wm. O. Lehr, and were accepted, provided the applicants could stand the examination. The applications of C. J. Peritz and Wm. E. Myers, for similar employment, were referred to the marshal.

J. M. Griffin and Jas. Brown were elected members of the fire department. Marshal Schad made several reports regarding his department, and the work that had been done, but no definite action was taken.

KUROPATKIN FORCED FROM NEW POSITIONS

country northward. With the Japanese in behind the Russian army at Tie Pass General Kuropatkin's position is extremely critical. Once the Japanese are across his rear in force, Kuropatkin would have to cut his way out or surrender.

Desperate and Bloody.

Santoupu, Eight Miles North of Tie Pass, Manchuria, Wednesday, March 15.—(Evening).—The Russians have abandoned their advanced positions on the Fan river where the desperate attack of the Japanese yesterday (March 14) was repulsed, and have fallen back upon the defense of Tie Pass. Previous to the retirement the supplies of wood, etc., collected there were set on fire.

A desperate bloody battle is now waging north of Tie Pass.

Tie Pass Occupied.

Tokio, March 16.—(noon).—The Japanese occupied Tie Pass at midnight, March 15.

ARMED CHINESE MAY ATTACK RAILROAD.

Harbin, March 16.—Large numbers of Chinese bandits and Chinese troops are reported to be west of Tsitsihar and an attack on the railroad is apprehended.

The city is being filled to overflowing with wounded soldiers from Mukden. Many Chinese suspects have been arrested here.

Second Heat in the Race.

Tokio, March 16.—(Noon).—Details of the occupation of Tie Pass have not been received at imperial army headquarters. An official bulletin reports the action and that the Japanese are in hot pursuit of the retreating Russians, but it does not mention any particulars of the fight.

Japs Land Again.

Tokio, March 16.—(4 p. m.).—The Japanese occupied Singking March 13. Singking, or Kenden, is situated about eighty miles almost due east of Mukden. A report received in Tokio March 14 from the Japanese headquarters in the field said: "In the direction of Singking our forces have been dislodging the enemy from Yingpau, eighteen miles east of Fushun and on March 11 occupied that place."

The Real Conditions.

Warsaw, March 16.—High Polish officials said today: "It is all very well to talk of continuing the war, but with no leaders, no generals, no soldiers, no guns and the theatre of war so far away we are unable to transport troops quickly, and the war appears to be ended now. True we have soldiers in the empire but it is impossible to withdraw them from central and southern Russia to Manchuria while domestic disturbances continue. All is quiet in Poland now but let orders for mobilization be given and we will have a revolution."

Paris, March 16.—Postponement of the proposed Russian loan continues to occupy the attention of official and financial circles. Bankers say the loan is not a failure and that adjustment may be reached. One banker, who visited St. Petersburg, quotes Minister Witte as saying: "We can afford defeat in Manchuria but not one in Paris." This is taken to indicate a strong feeling in St. Petersburg to grant all possible concessions to maintain Russia's financial position in the French markets. The peace movement has gained a strong impetus from the postponement of the loan.

Correspondents Alive.

Paris, March 16.—Ludovic Nadeau, the French newspaper correspondent, who was reported from Santoupu yesterday to have been killed by Chinese retreat at Mukden, after the Russian retreat at the same time that Mr. Little, the correspondent of the Chicago Daily News, was erroneously asserted to have lost his life, has cabled to his paper, the Journal, that he was made a prisoner at Mukden by the Japanese, and that he will be sent to Japan, where he hopes to regain his liberty.

Friendly to South.

Atlanta, Ga., March 16.—Congressman L. F. Livingston, of Georgia, is reported as saying he had a talk with President Roosevelt and the president assured him he hoped to please the people of the South in the appointments to be made. The president, Colonel Livingston said, intends to keep in republican ranks as long as he can find good men, but if it is necessary to go to the democratic party for good material he will do so. Colonel Livingston said there was no doubt that the president wanted to conciliate the South and he believes he will appoint fewer negroes in office here and more in the North.

Nan Patterson's Trial.

New York, March 16.—Nan Patterson will be put on trial once more to answer a charge of murdering Caesar Young, the wealthy nookmaker. This decision was reached to-day and it was announced at the district attorney's office that the second trial of the case would begin April 10. One jury which was selected to try her on the charge of murder was discharged, after the case was completed, because of the severe illness of one of its members. Another jury which heard the case was unable to agree. Numerous attempts to secure her release on bail since the last trial have failed.
