SURVEY FOR THE FLORIDA CANAL

GAINESVILLE MAN MAY GET BIG CONTRACT FROM THE UNITED STATES GOVERNMENT.

The Gainesville Sun of recent date contained the following, which will be read with interest:

Alexander W. Taylor, geodetic surveyor, civil and mining engineer of this city, is in correspondence with high officials relative to running a series of random lines of levels across the state of Florida for the purpose of ascertaining the best route for a ship canal, from a point near the mouth of the St. Marys river on the Atlantic side, running westward to the Suwannee river and Gulf of Mexico; and from the waters of Rice Creek on the St. Johns river across to the Withlacoochee river on the Gulf.

Mr. Taylor will probably have full charge of this important work as resident engineer, and will require the services of several assistant engineers and a large corps of workmen and teams. He expects to complete the work by the coming fall or winter, and make a good thing financially out of the job.

MAY BE CANDIDATE FOR MAYORALTY

A. V. CLUBBS IS BEING PROMINENTLY SPOKEN OF AS AN INDEPENDENT CANDIDATE.

Hon. A. V. Clubbs, one of the best known and most prominent citizens of the city, and one who has the interests of Pensacola at heart, is likely to be a candidate for mayor. Such was the rumor upon the streets yesterday afternoon, and from all indications he will announce after the white democratic primary has been concluded.

Mr. Clubbs is a man whom everyone respects. In fact he has gained the admiration of all during the time that he has held the position of president of the County Board of Public Instruction.

He will, it is understood, enter the race as an independent candidate, and notwithstanding the fact that the democrats of the city will stand by the primary, he will no doubt make a good run.

CONTENTION OF BROWARD UPHELD

COURT HOLDS THAT LEGISLATURE HAD NO RIGHT TO GRANT FLORIDA PUBLIC LANDS.

A Tallahassee special says: Information has reached here that Judge J. B. Wall has rendered a decision in favor of J. W. Malone in the case of Malone vs. T. Y. Youmans.

This was an ejectment suit brought by Judge J. W. Malone, of Quincy, who claimed title to certain lands under grant of the board of trustees of the Internal Improvement Fund, against T. J. Youmans, who claimed title under a railroad land grant. The case was decided at Arcadia.

This is a very important case, because it upholds the contention made by Governor Broward in his campaign for the governorship that the legislature had no right to grant large bodies of Everglades land to the railroad without the approval of the trustees of the Internal Improvement Fund. The Louisville and Nashville Railroad Company now has a suit pending against the state to secure possession of the major part of the state lands in the Everglades, on the ground of the land grants of the legislature to that road were illegal.

FRENCH FLEET MAY COME HERE

TWO OF THE FINE WAR SHIPS WILL PAY A VISIT TO THE BIG FLEET.

It is believed that two of the French cruisers, or possibly the entire fleet of that nation now in waters adjacent to Venezuela, will pay a visit to Pensacola during the next few weeks. In fact, it is more than probable that such will be done, owing to the trouble now existing in Venezuela.

Speaking of this a dispatch sent out from Washington, says: "In view of the unfavorable conditions in Venezuela at this moment the French armored cruiser Duplex and the protected cruiser Jurien de la Graviere, of twenty-three knots speed, which are now in the Caribbean, will be retained in that vicinity indefinitely."

"Although the greater part of the North Atlantic fleet is soon to come north as far as Pensacola for target practice, an adequate contingent will remain in Dominican waters to guard American interests there, and in case of an emergency in Venezuela, the fleet at Pensacola will be in easy cruising distance. It is possible that the French cruisers may touch at Pensacola during the stay there of the American fleet to obtain supplies or merely to pay a friendly visit."
