STANDARD OIL COMPANY TO PAY KENTUCKY FINE.

By Associated Press. Nashville, Tenn., March 23.—A dispatch to the Banner from Hopkinsville, Ky., says:

The Standard Oil Company has accepted judgment and fine of \$100 on one batch of fifty-one indictments recently returned against them charging them with selling without a license. Other indictments were continued pending the decision of the court of appeals on a similar case from Trigg county, Kentucky. The company contends that the payment of fine in one case kills the rest of the indictments.

New York Stock Market.

New York, March 23.—Speculative liquidation was in evidence in stocks this morning, and after some unavailing efforts to support the market, prices ran off sharply. The attack centered on Union Pacific, which was forced down 1 1/2 during the course of the morning. The prominent place in speculative interest held by this stock gave its movement a large influence on the whole market, but practically all the stocks which have been favorites in the late speculation for the advance were sold freely and suffered losses of a point or more. The low priced industrial stocks which were taken up during the latter part of the speculative movement were included in the weak list.

CHINESE SMUGGLED ACROSS THE BORDER.

By Associated Press. Yuma, A. T., March 23.—Twenty-four Chinese were discovered in a box car in the Southern Pacific yards here to-day, having been smuggled over the Mexican border at El Paso, Tex., and were on the way to Los Angeles. They were taken into custody.

PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT'S YACHT TO BE HERE SOON.

The Sylph, the private yacht of President Theodore Roosevelt, will reach port next week, according to information received at the local navy yard. The vessel sailed from Annapolis on the 19th, and will stop only for a few hours at some of the gulf ports.

SOUTHERN PROGRESS

Chattanooga, Tenn., March 23.—Southern industrial progress for the past week is reflected in reports of new industries as made to The Tradesman.
