REAL ESTATE MARKET REMAINS VERY ACTIVE

AND THE DEMAND FOR CITY PROPERTY CONTINUES ON THE INCREASE, MANY FIRMS NOTING SALES.

The real estate market continues to be in a firm and steady condition. In fact there has been a slight increase in the demand during the past week, and it is anticipated that during the next few weeks these favorable conditions will continue, and if anything, there will be an increased demand. The real estate dealers interviewed yesterday spoke as follows: L. S. Brown & Co.: The demand for Pensacola property increases daily, but we are experiencing great trouble in getting the property to sell, and particularly at a figure attractive to investors. Some owners of property have their ideas entirely too high as to price, thereby shutting out many new people who would probably buy could they get reasonable.

More buildings are in process of construction and in contemplation than ever before in the history of Pensacola. The local contractors have more than they can do with dispatch. Labor-

ers are getting good pay and everything is apparently in a flourishing condition.

Every day we have to turn off applicants for houses to rent, and many who want to purchase city and country property. Leslie E. Brooks: The market has been rather active during the past week, though I believe few large deals have been made. I have made a number of sales, mostly small, and to people who intend building homes. I must say that I can trace a large number of my sales to the ads. carried in The Journal.

Thos. C. Watson & Co.: We have made many sales during the week. In fact the market is brisk with a solid foundation, and prices, as a consequence are firm and advancing. We have made many sales of homes to the laboring classes, as well as to strangers during the past seven days, and have many deals on which will no doubt materialize during the next few weeks. We have also sold many vacant lots to prospective builders.

PROSPEROUS AND HAPPY SETTLEMENT OF BEULAH

ITS SCHOOL AND CHURCHES AND THE FERTILE SECTION OF WHICH IT IS THE CENTER—LOCATED 12 MILES FROM PENSACOLA ON "SHELBY'S ROAD."

Beulah, March 25.—Never having seen any letter in your valuable paper from here, I thought I would try and send you a few items and let the rest of the world know that Beulah still lives, even if not on the map. This is a veritable white man's country, as there are no negroes here except those in Varn Bro's. state convict camp, who are always under efficient guards and in no way cause any trouble in the settlement, and it seems to be an unwritten law that negroes shall not acquire land or be allowed to live here.

Beulah has two churches, Baptist and Methodist. Our school, under the able management of Mrs. Annie Bowman, has just closed a very successful term with an entertainment that was a surprise to everybody for the people thought that the little ones were so bashful that they would fail, but the way they spoke their pieces and the confidence they had in themselves just put the croakers out of business. Mrs. Bowman is surely the right teacher in the right place and we hope she will have the school next term.

On "Shelby's Road."

We are situated on the new "hara road," or "Shelby's road," as it is called, about 12 miles northwest of Pensacola. This road will be an enduring monument to the efficiency of Ex-Commissioner Shelby as long as time goes on, and if we never get another we can say, with the other fellow, "Well done thou good and faithful public servant, enter into the joys of hauling blocks to town without cussing."

Among other blessings we have free rural delivery, and in the person of H. O. Wilder have one of the best carriers that goes the road. He is competent and obliging and always on time without regard to weather for he has an up-to-date mail wagon which was a great help to him during the cold weather.

Every one is busy getting in their crops just now. A good deal of sugar cane is raised here and with two mills, A. J. Buzbee and George Davis, get out a lot of excellent syrup for a small community. This is in the Perdido country and right here can be seen some of the best young peach orchards in the country. Why men will go to Baldwin county, Alabama, and pay big prices for no better land and then haul what they raise right through here to Pensacola is something I can not understand. One man told me he lived 40 miles from Pensacola and I have met him five times this fall and winter going in with produce.

"A CLEAN SLATE."

"A Clean Slate," heralded as the smartest success of the London and New York season, will be presented at the opera house next Friday and Saturday nights by arrangement with Charles B. Dillingham, Alberta Gallatin and the original Madison Square Theatre production, as presented at the Criterion Theatre, London, will positively appear.

This captivating comedy by R. C. Carton has been endorsed by the New York and English press as a better play than "Lord and Lady Alky," another Broadway success by the same author.

It is said by the management that the title of "A Clean Slate" conveys no thought of the rare delicacy and real charm of this merriest of modern comedies. Very briefly told, the plot is a story of sentiment, embracing an intensely human and serious dramatic love interest.

ALBERTA GALLATIN.

Alberta Gallatin who plays "A Clean Slate" on Friday and Saturday will have for her guests the local officers of the Daughters of the Confederacy. Miss Gallatin is a very enthusiastic daughter, being one of the founders of the Hope-Mawrey Chapter of Norfolk, Va. Her father was Colonel Albert Jenkins Gallatin, C. S. A., one of General Lee's staff, and was mortally wounded at Seven Pines.

Miss Gallatin will be remembered as playing "Ghosts" here last season. This year's production is a greater success than "Ghosts" and a well filled house is indicated by the advance requests for seats.

The dominant feature of Florence Gale's acting is her method of repression of self, her subordination of the age, which permits us to wander in the poet's dreamland, instead of merely watching a player's tricks of acting, and listening to her vocal performance. She uses her gifts to present Shakespeare pure and simple, not to exploit her own grace of movement, or music of voice. In every art, simplicity is highest attainment.

So in the acting of a play which you see a player going through wonderful contortions of body and face, and hear him or her using trick and device of vocality, rest assured you are not witnessing the work of a true artist. Florence Gale is simplicity and naturalness itself. Her performance of Rosalind is free from so-called acting, from artificiality, from staginess. She truly "holds the mirror up to nature" which Shakespeare himself said was what the player should aim to do.

Allan Dale, the famous New York critic says: "I like Miss Gale's Rosalind immensely. She gave a natural, sincere and decidedly interesting portrayal of the many-sided Rosalind, but I think it is the woman herself we like, and for one, I am sure I should admire her equally as much in any congenial role." The delightful comedy will appear in Pensacola tomorrow night.
