## PROMINENT PENSACOLIANS ENDORSE WHITE PRIMARY

HON. JNO. S. BEARD AND HON. T. A. JENNINGS BOTH ENDORSE IT FOR MUNICIPAL NOMINATIONS—STRONG WORDS FROM STRONG MEN.

The White Primary which is to be held next Tuesday for the purpose of nominating candidates for municipal offices is growing in strength every day and its supporters are enthusiastic over the opportunity to vote for candidates in a clean contest.

A Journal representative yesterday saw Hon. Jno. S. Beard in reference to his position on the White Primary. Mr. Beard does not reside in the city, but he readily expressed himself on the matter and said:

**Mr. Beard's Views.**  
"I am emphatically in favor of the Primary. For a number of years our municipal elections have been decided by the ignorant and often purchasable Negro vote. A White Primary will eliminate this great evil and place the municipal elections under the control of the intelligent public spirit of the city."  
"The only objection, so far as I know, that has been raised to the primary is that there was some irregularity in the call. There is, and I think can be, no charge of fraud or unfairness; and the irregularity, if such exists, is merely technical and immaterial—the result of mistake or honest error and not of deliberation."

"And however that may be, it is infinitesimal as compared with the benefits of a White Primary."

"I have for years been in favor of White Primaries in state, county and city. Every white voter should, and I hope will, participate in the Primary next Tuesday, and then give a loyal support to the nominees of that Primary, whoever they may be."

**Mr. Jennings Endorses It.**  
Hon. T. A. Jennings was seen and in reply to a question said:  
"I am heartily in favor of White Primary elections to nominate State, County and City officers. I am not advocating the nomination of any particular candidates, but I shall vote in the City Primary on next Tuesday and then the nominees of that Primary, whoever they may be, will receive my support in the general City election in June."

**Opinions Have Weight.**  
The opinions of two such men as Messrs. Beard and Jennings are worth something. In the primary which elected delegates to the last national democratic convention, Mr. Beard received the largest vote cast for a national delegate; and in both primary and state election Mr. Jennings received the largest vote cast for presidential elector.

**Russian Second Squadron.**  
Durbin, Italy, March 29.—The British steamer Dart, which arrived here to-day from Rango on February 28, reports having passed, March 19, thirty warships and fourteen colliers steaming eastward, 250 miles northeast of the Island of Madagascar.  
It is apparently confirmed that the Russian Second Pacific squadron, commanded by Vice-Admiral Rojestvensky, left Nossi Be island, off the northwest coast of Madagascar, about March 16, and if the warships steamed very slowly they probably formed the squadron sighted by the Dart, now at Durbin.

**Doubasoff Rewarded.**  
St. Petersburg, March 29.—Vice-Admiral Doubasoff, who acted as commissioner for Russia on the internal commission which enquired into the North sea incident has been appointed aide-de-camp general to the emperor with the retention of his present post of chairman of the technical board of the admiralty.

**Subscribed in an Hour.**  
London, March 29.—The portion of the Japanese loan of \$150,000,000 allotted to London was greatly over-subscribed within an hour of the time of the opening of the banks this morning. For an hour before the doors opened throngs crowded the vicinity of the issuing houses and throughout the morning a steady flood of applicants, among whom were many women taxed the extra staffs of the banking establishments engaged to deal in many thousands of applications and the enormous subsequent deliveries gave evidence of public interest in the loan.

## HOSPITAL NEED NO SEDATIVES

NEW YORK INSTITUTION HAS ENTIRELY DONE AWAY WITH DRUGS FOR QUIETING PATIENTS.

New York, March 29.—By the systematic use of various forms of heat and cold baths, jets, and fumes, vapor and hot air baths, the Manhattan state hospital on Ward's Island, has done away entirely with sedatives or mechanical restraint for the patients, even when violently demented or in strong delirium.

This hospital, the first public institution in the country to adopt the use of water as a recognized part of its course of treatment, has been experimenting and tabulating the results for some time.

Forms of "water treatment" are in use there which are said not to have been tried elsewhere notably the "continuous bath" for patients in violent delirium. The patient, placed in a bath tub of water at exactly blood heat, is kept there under observation by expert nurses and physicians for hours—for days, if necessary—until the delirium has abated. In one case it was found necessary to keep the patient immersed in the water fourteen days. She came out of the delirium, and with other branches of the treatment recovered from her dementia. The death rate in such cases was formerly 60 per cent, but the physicians having tried the experiment believe their treatment will save the life of every patient under delirium, unless some other form of insanity or physical disease sets in.

Under the new scheme patients no longer subject to convulsions are kept indoors in tents and pavilions. They are first examined carefully by a physician and the nurses who then from the data map out a plan of treatment. In some cases, a bath of carbon dioxide has been used. An elaborate arrangement of bath appliances has been established in the hospital.

**TEN WITNESSES HEARD IN BEEF TRUST INQUIRY.**

Chicago, March 29.—Ten witnesses, several of them employees of the Chicago packers, were heard to-day before the grand jury which is examining into the affairs of the beef trust. All were questioned rigidly as to whether they had been approached by outsiders since being called as witnesses, the jury being apparently more anxious to secure further evidence of tampering than evidence against the combination. From a federal official it was learned to-night that several witnesses had been approached, and it is reported that further indictments will follow.

Chipley, March 29.—Chipley continues to steadily improve in the way of residences and other buildings.

W. D. Campbell will erect in the near future a handsome cottage on Forest street.

A preliminary meeting was held to make preparations for establishing a national banking business here, and from all information we can secure, the banking firm of Dekle & Co., with other capitalists, will before October 1 next, construct a two-story brick building on the Gray lot on Railroad street, and Dekle & Co. will be merged into the new national bank with offices in the lower story, while the second story will also be used for offices. There is also some talk of the K. of P. lodge taking an interest, using a part for a lodgeroom. The building is not to cost less than \$15,000.

The B. C. & G. railroad has almost two miles of steel rail laid, and is continuing the work. Labor being scarce, they have to work slowly, yet we are assured by the promoters and business men connected with the enterprise that a regular schedule will be put on the road before September 1, next.

The farmers are very busy planting their crops, and seem to be planting more grain than cotton this season.

The price of timber and lumber keeps the sawmills running on full time.

### NEW ELECTRIC LINE TO TRAVERSE GULF COAST.
