There will be no hiatus in the government of the canal zone because of the resignation of the Commission, as these will not be accepted until their successors are appointed. It is expected the announcement of the new Commission will be made soon.

BIG FUND FOR AMERICAN ACADEMY OF FINE ARTS.

New York, March 30.—An endowment fund of \$1,000,000, which has been for some time in process of formation for the maintenance of the permanent home of the American Academy of Fine Arts in Rome, is reported to be rapidly nearing completion. The seventh contribution of \$100,000, according to the Tribune, expected from Yale University. A similar contribution will be made in the name of Columbia University. Three subscriptions to fill out the round million are expected by June 1.

ASIATIC LINER HAS AN IMMENSE CARGO.

Portland, Oregon, March 30.—When the Portland and Asiatic Liner Arabia sails for the Orient to-day she will carry a shipment of 320 hogsheads and 320 tierces of leaf tobacco and 375 cases of cigarettes. The value of this portion of the steamer's cargo is almost \$200,000 and is understood to be the largest single shipment of tobacco ever made from a Pacific coast port. The destination of the tobacco is Kobe and Yokohama.

second Mongolian yoke, the Japanese being described as worse than the locusts in Europe. It is added that once they establish themselves in Asia they will not only possess Manchuria and Korea, but will swarm over and drive out the Russians from Siberia.

Another Steamer Captured. Tokio, March 30.—The steamer Industry, whose nationality has not been ascertained, was seized by the Japanese on March 28. She was presumably bound for Vladivostok.

The British steamer Mars, which was stranded off Rural promontory on March 17 while attempting the passage off Soya strait, has broken in two under the engines. Her bow and stern are both submerged. Her captain and nine of the crew have been rescued. Her mate died of exposure.

Intervention Not Favored. Berlin, March 30.—The suggestion that an international congress might be called to arrange the Russian Japanese terms of peace finds no favor at the foreign office here, where a full settlement between the belligerents without interference of other powers is much preferred. An international congress would mean a derangement of the present equilibrium of interests because those undertakings to settle peace would seek advantages for themselves as a proper brokerage for the transaction. The strongest obstacle against peace appears to be the influence of the Russian military body which still stands resolutely for a continuance of the war.

YACHT SYLPH IS AT JACKSONVILLE MRS. ROOSEVELT AND PARTY WILL BOARD VESSEL AT ST. AUGUSTINE ON SATURDAY.

The president's yacht Sylph entered port late yesterday afternoon and anchored in midstream, and has attracted much attention to-day, says the Jacksonville Metropolis. The Sylph is a gunboat, though generally known as President Roosevelt's private yacht. She came here from Charleston, where she arrived Sunday last. Lieut. Frank T. Evans, son of "Fighting Bob" Evans is in command of the Sylph. The pilot is Capt. Highlander, commander of the launch Water Lily, of the sixth light-house district. Captain Highlander is very familiar with all the Florida waters.

The Sylph is a converted gunboat, of 162 tons and of 550-horse power. She is a single screw vessel.

The News from Washington. The Washington correspondent of the News and Courier writes Monday as follows: "Mrs. Roosevelt and the children of the White House, with the exception of Miss Alice Roosevelt, expect to leave here next Friday for St. Augustine, Fla. The president's family will pass through Charleston and Savannah on their way to Florida, but no arrangements have been made to stop at either of the cities named. The trip south will be made in a private car over the Atlantic Coast Line attached to a Florida special. At the White House no details of the trip are obtainable. All inquiries on the subject were met with the announcement: "There is nothing to be said about the trip at this time." They will be met by young Theodore Roosevelt and Dr. Rixey, who are now duck shooting near Port Royal.

"The Sylph will proceed at once to St. Augustine to be in readiness for the president's wife and children. They will cruise in the waters along the Florida coast and explore the St. Johns and other rivers. This will take Mrs. Roosevelt and her family away while the president is on his trip west, and will be practically close to the White House temporarily. At the same time it will be a delightful recreation for Mrs. Roosevelt after the fatigue of the social season."
