ACCIDENTAL DEATH OF C. A. BRIGHT

WINCHESTER RIFLE DISCHARGED AND THE BULLET PASSED THROUGH HIS HEART.

C. A. Bright, a prominent naval stores operator, who is well known in Florida and Southern Georgia, was accidentally killed Wednesday afternoon by being shot through the heart. The accident occurred in Baldwin county, where Mr. Bright was conducting the gathering of turpentine.

From all accounts Mr. Bright had been hunting with a Winchester rifle and was returning to his quarters late in the afternoon, when he tripped over some underbrush and fell. In some manner the rifle was discharged, the bullet passing through his heart and causing instant death. The body was discovered a short time afterwards by two of the men attached to the camp, who were returning to the quarters after finishing work for the day. The remains were brought to Pensacola yesterday morning and prepared for burial, being shipped out to Bay Minette yesterday morning at 7 o'clock, where the family resided.

HEAVY BUYING BY RAILROADS

THE MAIN FEATURE OF THE IRON MARKET—GENERAL CONDITIONS IN THE TRADE.

New York, March 30.—The continued heavy buying of material of all kinds by railroad interests is still the main feature of the iron markets, says the Iron Age. It is reflected in quite a steady flow of small additional rail orders in a very heavy demand for plates and in the buying of considerable quantities of structural material.

The position of the plate market is attracting particular attention. Eastern mills are selling considerable quantities in the western markets, notably Cleveland and Pittsburgh, and in some instances are securing premiums. It is understood that the leading interest is fully booked for a long time ahead, and is on the verge of being a purchaser to cover contracts. It begins to look as though some foreign material may have to be brought in this year. There has been another burst of buying of basic pig iron in the Eastern markets. In the Philadelphia district three steel mills have in the aggregate bought 36,000 tons at prices varying from \$14.60 to \$16.75 delivered for the third and fourth quarters. A mill in the New York district has taken 8,500 tons.

The Pittsburg Market for pig iron for steel manufacture is pretty bare, it having been impossible to squeeze out 10,000 to 15,000 tons of Bessemer pig for the Cleveland district for immediate delivery.

The steel corporations, it is estimated, will need about 40,000 tons for April delivery, which has not yet been contracted for. The general jobbing foundry trade is still quite slack.

A tide-water steel plant has purchased one lot of 60,000 tons of foreign Bessemer pig at or about \$18.50. Baltimore, and may have taken additional quantities. This, however, is to cover partially sales of steel rails made to South America, taking advantage of the drawback.

An interesting situation is developing in bridge material. A good deal of business has been placed. A leading interest has booked during the week about 20,000 tons in individually small lots. While the bookings are very heavy and drawings and specifications are still coming in slowly, there is danger therefore of a rush later on which the fabrication end with ample reserve capacity will easily care for, but which may prove embarrassing to the structural and plate mills that are even now threatened with congestion.

New York Stock Market. New York, March 30.—The market opened under pressure to-day, which was marked by declines of an eighth to a half for the majority of stocks.

Union Pacific, Atchison and Locomotive lost about a point, and Pennsylvania, Baltimore and Ohio and Reading declined large fractions. One or two of the independent steel companies were slightly higher. Wabash Debenture B bonds rose 2 points and Lackawana 4.
