R. R. COMMISSION ISSUES NEW ORDER IT PROVIDES PER MILE FOR CERTAIN CLASS OF FREIGHT CARRIED OVER FLORIDA ROADS.

Tallahassee, April 6.—The railroad commission has issued the following order in the matter of prescribing rates on class P: Due notice having been given to all the railroad companies and common carriers doing business wholly or in part within the state of Florida, that there would be a meeting of the Railroad Commissioners of the State of Florida at their offices in the City of Tallahassee, Florida on the 27th day of March, A. D. 1905, for the purpose of considering the adoption of rates in lieu of rates now known and designated as class P rates, at which time all the railroad companies and common carriers would be given an opportunity to be heard and to show cause, if any they had, why the proposed change should not be adopted.

It is further ordered that the following commodities in class P be transported at the above named rates with 15 per cent. added: Tan Bark, C. L. min., 20,000 lbs.; barrels, empty, C. L. min., 10,000 lbs.; box material, N. O. S. C. L. min., 30,000 lbs.; gravel, C. L. min., 30,000 lbs.; melons, C. L. min., 24,000 lbs.; mounding, N. O. S. C. L. min., 30,000 lbs.; sawdust in barrels or sacks, C. L. min., 24,000 lbs.; oyster shells for paving, C. L. min., 30,000 lbs.; rough stone (except marble and slate) C. L. min., 30,000 lbs.; earthenware, cups and galvanized iron attachments to be used in the collection of crude turpentine, C. L. min., 24,000 lbs.

The following is the report of the treasurer of the Woman's Home for the year ending February 1, 1905: Balance on hand last report... \$ 52.98 Receipts from all sources... 424.08 Total... \$477.06

Our household expenses are much reduced by the generosity of several of the merchants. Mr. M. F. Gonzalez furnishes the flour we use; Mr. Sol Cahn most of the sugar; Mr. W. S. Garfield has supplied all the ice during the past summer; the water company has always donated the water; we seldom have to buy coal during the winter; Wright's mill gives us wood—we simply pay for the hauling. One kind druggist for several years has furnished all of the medicine. The physicians respond kindly to our calls on them. The Pilots' Benevolent Association send us a regular monthly contribution.

On Thanksgiving and Christmas days we are generously remembered by the Ellis; Mr. McHugh, the First National Bank and others, whose names we could not get. It is gratifying to know that we have been relieved by the sale of a piece of property of the debt on the home. We have recently lost one inmate by death, an old woman, eighty-five years old, who was made comfortable and happy during the last years of her life. We have at present seven inmates and in addition there are two or three outside whom we assist regularly. We never refuse an appeal for charity, for which we are very grateful to the kind ones who give to us so cheerfully. We never make an appeal in vain.

James Bryant, who is employed by the Southern States Lumber Co. at Seminole, came home one day last week sick with the fever, but at this writing is better.

Theophilus Perry has bought Frank Bradley's place and moved on the same last week. I did not learn where Mr. Bradley moved to. Mrs. Cora Waters has moved to the place vacated by Mr. Perry as caretaker for the present, but may remain permanently. Miss Laura Bowman is making her brother, Walter Bowman, and wife a visit this week and as both ladies are school teachers and are putting in their time while together studying for the coming examination, Walter says they come pretty near making life a burden for him.

ARRESTED FOR ALLEGED MURDER. RESULT OF KILLING OF ALLEN BROWN AT BOGGY BAYOU LAST JANUARY. The DeFuniak Breeze says: Readers of the Breeze will remember the account published the first week in January of the shooting from ambush of Allen Brown at Boggy Bayou, and that the coroner's inquest brought out no evidence to attach the crime to any one. Since then, however, Sheriff Campbell has been conducting a quiet investigation in the matter, and as a result sufficient circumstantial evidence has been secured to justify the issue of warrants for the arrest of Jas. Moore, Mott Davis and Bud Hudson.

Last Tuesday the sheriff arrested Moore where he was at work seven or eight miles above Crestview, and immediately upon his arrival here with Moore, Deputies Gauley and Taunton left for the Boggy country after the others. Going by way of Freeport they secured a launch and landing on the beach a mile or more from Davis's house secured him without difficulty, and then went to Hudson's where they found him in bed, and placed him under arrest, and they were lodged in jail here Thursday morning.

State Solicitor Kehoe is to be here Saturday when the accused are to have a preliminary hearing. As we understand the evidence against the parties it is so far entirely circumstantial, and may be easily explained when the case comes for trial, and this seems to be particularly true as to Hudson.
