SHOTTER CO VS. WILLIAMS CO.

The Savannah News of April 5 says: An interesting suit was instituted in the city court yesterday morning by the S. P. Shotton Company to recover \$1,022.45 from the J. P. Williams Company.

It is claimed that in 1904, between the months of April and December, the petitioner purchased 11,514 barrels of spirits of turpentine from the defendant company, the same being represented to contain 591,341 gallons of spirits of turpentine. The amount paid the defendant was \$307,598.17.

The turpentine was delivered in "Montgomery" barrels, which, it is claimed, were represented to be of standard capacity. The S. P. Shotton Company charges that despite the representation of the contrary it is charged the barrels were of standard size and capacity, they were defective and that each of the 11,514 barrels measured from a half to one gallon short, which, in the course of the entire transaction, netted a shortage of 7,801.38 gallons, or, valued at from 47 to 54 cents a gallon, represented a total overcharge on the part of the defendant of \$4,063.02.

It is shown in the petition that a standard barrel is so constructed that by the application of a gauge the amount of spirits of turpentine contained therein can be actually determined.

Barrels Were Faulty. The petitioner asserts that it paid for the amount of turpentine gauged as for standard barrels, but charges that the "Montgomery" barrels which were used in the shipment were not of standard size as described, but, on the contrary, it is charged the barrels used were differently and faultily constructed. The defect alleged consisted, it is charged, in the staves used in constructing the barrels, they being flat howled instead of gouge howled, standard barrels being gouge howled, and containing from one-half to one gallon more than the "Montgomery" barrels.

It is averred that the fact that the barrels were flat howled instead of gouge howled could not be discovered by an ordinary inspection, and could only be discovered by breaking up the barrels and examining the inner sides of the staves.

It is also charged that by reason of the defect the J. P. Williams Company received payment for from one-half to one gallon more turpentine in each of the 11,514 barrels than was delivered.

Has Held Back Money. It is shown that the 11,514 barrels delivered, by reason of their flat howled staves, gauged an average of .683 gallons more per barrel than was actually contained therein, and it is charged that the petitioner paid for the difference, the value of the total amount of the turpentine received being \$303,535.15, while the amount charged against the petitioner was \$307,598.17, a difference in favor of the defendant of \$4,063.02.

The petitioner claims that it has held \$3,040.50 out of moneys due the J. P. Williams Company, and placed the same to the credit of the deficit account as shown in the petition to be \$4,063.02, leaving a balance due from the defendant in the sum of \$1,022.45.

The petitioner says that it has made demand upon the defendant company for the moneys alleged to be due, and the same was refused.

New York Cotton Market.
New York, April 6.—The cotton market opened steady at an advance of two or three points. The weather made a rather more favorable showing than yesterday and receipts continued large. After selling about three to five points net higher, the market eased off under pressure from spot houses and New Orleans interests. There was a fair demand about two points under last night's figure and the market later became quiet around that level.

Wall Street Stocks.

New York, April 6.—Industrial stocks took a prominent place in the opening trading today and showed some striking advances. There were running sales of 8,000 shares of United States steel preferred at 100 1/4 and 100 1/2, compared with 99 1/2 last night, and the common rose an extreme half on the transfer of 15,000 shares. Car made a gain of 1 1/4 and Locomotive, Lead, Federal Mining preferred and Brooklyn Transit about 1 point. Baltimore and Ohio rose 1 1/4, and Chesapeake and Ohio nearly 1 point. There were many large fractional gains also amongst industrial stocks.

BRYAN LANDED A. W. GILCHRIST

CLEVER WORK OF JACKSONVILLE POLITICIAN SECURED ELECTION OF SPEAKER OF HOUSE.

The Jacksonville Metropolis says: Albert W. Gilchrist, who has won the speakership of the House of Representatives is one of the best known and most popular democrats in Florida. He owes his triumph mainly to the shrewd work of W. J. Bryan, of Jacksonville, who has laid numerous wires lately to knock out Watson, of Osceola county. The committee will show how Bryan worked and of some deals made.

Mr. Gilchrist furnishes an interesting career. He is a descendant of the Rev. John Wauer, a distinguished Baptist preacher in Virginia during the Colonial period. He was raised in Quincy, Gadsden county, Florida, his father having moved there from South Carolina during the 40's before his marriage.

Mr. Gilchrist served in the legislatures of 1893, 1895 and 1903. He was nominated in the primaries without opposition and was elected without opposition for the session of 1905.

In 1878, 1879, 1880 and 1881 he served as a cadet at West Point as private, sergeant and lieutenant.

At West Point Gilchrist was found deficient in experimental philosophy. In June, 1881, having then finished the hardest part of the course, he stood in the teens in what is known as the second section.

Upon entering West Point the class is divided into eight to ten or more sections, alphabetically. Those who do well go up, and the contrary go down to lower sections.

The professor in philosophy made Gilchrist the best known man that ever went to West Point, oftentimes saying to the cadets in the fifth and sixth sections, "You think you are safe here, but I want you to understand that I found Mr. Gilchrist in the second section." Mr. Gilchrist made it an incident of his life to return to West Point as a member of the board of visitors.

The professors at West Point are all colonels. Mr. Gilchrist made it a point to go back to West Point as a brigadier general and talked to those colonels. One of the professors said to Gilchrist: "I have been having a lot of fun out of Prof. Blank, saying to him: 'Gracious! What is the matter with your department? The men I find deficient don't come back here on the board of visitors.'"

Gilchrist served on the staff of Governors Perry and Fleming as colonel and inspector general of the state. Governor Mitchell appointed him as brigadier general.

On June 17, 1898, Mr. Gilchrist resigned the position of brigadier general of militia to become a private in Company C, Third United States Volunteer Infantry. He served in this regiment as private, lieutenant, post adjutant, captain and acting major, stationed in Santiago, Cuba. He was also provost marshal of the city of Guantanamo and a part of the time captain of the port and provost marshal of the city of Manzanillo.
