MORE ARRESTS ARE MADE ON GAMBLING CHARGE

AND GAMBLING PARAPHERNALIA IS SEIZED AND IS IN CUSTODY OF THE SHERIFF AT THE COUNTY JAIL.

More arrests were made yesterday by the county authorities, and in all cases the parties are charged with keeping gambling houses. Early yesterday morning the officials placed Proprietor Sims and Manager Goldbach, of Hotel Escambia, under arrest, charging them with keeping a gambling house. The place raided the night previous was conducted in one of the rooms of the hotel, and for this reason the proprietor and manager were arrested. Bonds were placed at \$2,500 each, which were quickly given and the parties released. Those arrested in the raid of the night previous and placed in jail have not yet given the necessary bond.

All the gambling paraphernalia, which was seized by the officers when the place was raided, was taken to the county jail yesterday, and is now held there. A considerable portion was sent to the jail Friday night, and yesterday a transfer wagon was secured and the remainder carted away to the jail.

Loudeberry Arrested.

Ed. Loudeberry, who is charged with keeping a gambling house at the southwest corner of Palafox and Zaragoza streets, over Dannheisser's saloon, was placed under arrest yesterday afternoon by the sheriff. The latter found him near Ferry Pass on a hunting trip, and brought him to the city. His bond, that of \$2,500, was fixed by Judge Parkhill of the circuit court, and was soon made by the defendant.

The sheriff seized all of the fixtures in the place, which consisted of "crap" tables, cards, chips, roulette wheels, dice and other paraphernalia used in gambling. This was taken to the jail and is held there pending the trial.

It was rumored upon the streets last night that other arrests would be made soon.

THE TELEPHONE SYSTEM WILL BE IMPROVED

AT LEAST TWENTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS WILL BE EXPENDED AT ONCE, AND LATER MUCH MORE WILL BE SPENT.

The local telephone system, which is now considered one of the best in the South for a city of Pensacola's size, is shortly to be further improved. The head officials of the Southern Bell Telephone Company have authorized the expenditure of \$25,000 at once, and later this will be increased to possibly \$100,000, as it is the intention of the company to keep up with the growth and demands of the city.

The improvements will be in the increase in aerial facilities, and many new lines will be put in and others extended, so as to cover the city thoroughly. Manager Bache, who assumed charge of the local business some eighteen months ago, stated yesterday afternoon that the company had been unable, during the past few weeks, to add to the list of subscribers, owing to the lack of facilities, but that within a short time a much larger number could be cared for than at present.

Another improvement which is now under way is the placing of a copper metallic circuit between Pensacola and Mobile, thus giving Pensacola three circuits. There has just been installed the fourth section of the switchboard in the operating room, and this will care for the increased business. The exchange now has more than twelve hundred subscribers, an increase during the past eighteen months of about 60 per cent.

The quarters now occupied by the exchange are much more commodious and comfortable than formerly. The entire building has been leased, one side being used exclusively for offices for the manager and clerical force, and the other for the operating department.

The increase in business has caused an increase in the force, and the company has now in its employ over thirty people.
