### ARMY AND NAVY NOTES.

Ensign John W. Timmons, U. S. N., has been ordered to Washington for duty in the Bureau of Ordnance, navy department. Ensign Timmons is a son-in-law of Vice-President Fairbanks, and will probably be retained at headquarters until his shore duty has expired.

Brig. Gen. Fitzhugh Lee, U. S. A., will deliver the oration at the Memorial Day exercises of Col. William L. Curry Post, G. A. R., of Philadelphia. This will be the first Memorial Day address delivered by an officer of the Confederate Army under Grand Army auspices in the state of Pennsylvania.

Old Dominion Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, on April 6, discussed and endorsed the proposition of Gen. Fitzhugh Lee, U. S. A., to have the remains of the Indian princess, Pocahontas, brought here for interment on Jamestown Island. ## Beautiful City of Apalachicola

The pretty little city of Apalachicola, situated at the mouth of the Chattahoochee river where that stream pours its turbid waters into Apalachicola bay, is about eight hours run from St. Andrews Bay on the steamer Tarpon, and is reached on the regular eastbound trip soon after sunrise on Thursday morning. Cape San Blas, at the western entrance to Apalachicola bay is passed about 3 a. m. and, if the breeze is moderately stiff, the voyager unused to the rolling of a vessel is apt to feel somewhat uneasy for a short time. It is soon over, however, and soon after rounding the cape the channel leading up to the city, marked for several miles by a row of piling, is entered by the vessel which lands at wharf in the river after picking its way through the numerous vessels which compose the "Mosquito fleet" of oystermen.

### Natural Advantages.

Apalachicola is one of the oldest cities in the South and, a quarter of a century before the civil war stood third in importance as a cotton port on the Gulf coast. The city possesses wonderful natural advantages both as regards its shipping facilities and the territory surrounding it. The climate is superb and the soil of Franklin county of which it is the county seat, is capable of growing anything that can be grown in this latitude.

The bay is filled with oysters and every species of fish known to the Gulf of Mexico and the traffic in fish and oysters forms one of the principal industries of the city. In fact it is doubtful if any gulf city can boast of as extensive oyster fisheries. Several large oyster canning factories are located here employing a large number of hands, all of whom receive good wages. Hundreds of vessels are engaged in the business.


### Manufacturing Interests.

One of the largest saw mills on the Gulf coast, that of the Cypress Lumber Company, is located at Apalachicola, and carries what is said to be the largest stock of lumber in the South. The Loxley Lumber Company also operate a large plant near the city. The city has an extensive ice manufacturing plant, several smaller manufacturing, a beautiful cathedral, a convent, churches of every denomination and schools that are the equal of any in the state. The city is well laid out and has miles of shell roads. In fact the fine hard roads are one of the most notable features of the city. Fine residences are numerous and there is an air of content and happiness about the place that is at once impressive and satisfying.

In the country along the river north of Apalachicola an immense quantity of honey is raised, nearly all of which is marketed through there. Hundreds of barrels crates and pails are shipped annually, all of which finds a ready sale at high prices.

### Ye Editor-Jurist.

There is only one newspaper in Apalachicola, The Times, of which H.

W. Johnston is editor and proprietor. The paper is issued weekly, circulates generally throughout that section of the state and is unquestionably one of the brightest and most readable weekly papers in the state. In addition to his editorial duties Mr. Johnston holds down the office of justice of the peace and when the writer called upon him a few days since was

busily engaged upholding the dignity of the law.

Every kind of business is represented in the busy little city, and well represented at that. The stores are thoroughly up to date and carry large stocks of goods. That they are enterprising is attested by the fact that they nearly all advertise liberally. The hotels are good and the people extremely hospitable.

Apalachicola has been seriously handicapped for many years by a lack of railroad facilities but work has been begun recently on a line that will not only give the city an outlet to the north but will also materially develop the country tributary to Apalachicola. With the railroad will undoubtedly come deep water, and when an adequate deep water channel is provided by the government Apalachicola will take on new life and, by the time the isthmian canal is completed, will take its rightful place among the leading cities of the Gulf coast.
