## TO CELEBRATE RETURN OF BATTLE FLAGS MAY 2

LEGISLATURE IS PREPARING PROGRAM FOR FORMAL RECEPTION OF BATTLE STAINED EMBLEMS WHICH ARE NOW IN THE STATE CAPITAL BUILDING.

The following is from the Tallahassee Capital's report of the proceedings of the legislature:

The joint committee to prepare program for the celebration of the return of confederate battle flags by the United States to this state, presented its report, suggesting a program of exercises for the occasion, to be held in the hall of representatives on May 2nd, at 10:30 o'clock.

The report was as follows:

**Report of the Committee.**

Tallahassee, Fla., April 17, 1905.

To the Honorable Park M. Trammell,

President of the Senate, and Honorable Albert W. Gilchrist, Speaker

of the House of Representatives:

Gentlemen—Your joint committee

appointed to suggest and prepare for an appropriate celebration, by joint assembly of the two houses of the legislature, on the return to the state

of the Confederate battle flags of Florida troops heretofore held by the United States government, have the honor to report that at a meeting of the committee, at which Governor Broward presided, and Mr. Jewell, of Orange, acted as secretary, the following plan of celebration was adopted and is hereby recommended.

First—That the hour of 10:30 a. m.

May the 2nd next, be fixed for such joint assembly and celebration in the Hall of the House of Representatives.

Second—That Governor Napoleon B. Broward, Colonel R. H. M. Davidson, of Quincy, Fla., and the Honorable Francis P. Fleming, of Jacksonville, Fla., be requested to deliver addresses on the occasion.

Third—That Hon. George P. Raney be invited to introduce the speakers.

Fourth—That the officers of the State government and Colonel Norvell, of the United States Army, now on military duty at the capital, be invited to be present and participate in the celebration, and to occupy seats on the floor of the house to be specially provided for them.

Fifth—That the Adjutant General be invited to assist in the arrangements for the celebration.

Sixth—That the several Florida Chapters of the Daughters of the Confederacy at Tallahassee be requested to provide music for the occasion.

Eighth—That the Sergeant-at-Arms of the House of Representatives be directed to have the Representative Hall suitably prepared with seats and arranged for the celebration.

Ninth—That the Senate and House of Representatives take due action for the holding of such joint assembly.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

Immediately after the foregoing report was read and ordered spread upon the Journal, General Jewell offered the following concurrent resolution, which, under a waiver of the rules, was adopted by the house and ordered certified to the senate:

Concurrent Resolution No. 22, by Mr. Jewell of Orange:

Resolved by the House of Representatives, the Senate concurring,

That the report of the joint committee appointed to suggest and prepare a suitable programme for an appropriate celebration by a joint assembly of the two Houses of the Legislature, of the return to the state of the Confederate battle flags of the Florida troops heretofore held by the United States government, and the suggestions therein made, be and the same are hereby adopted.

Resolved further, That said committee be and is hereby directed to extend, in the name of the Legislature of the State of Florida, the several invitations and make the several requests recommended by such report.

Resolved further, That the Senate and House of Representatives take due action for the holding of such joint assembly in the hall of the House of Representatives at 10:30 o'clock a. m., May the 2nd next.

Resolved further, That the Sergeant-at-Arms of the House of Representatives be directed to have the Representative Hall suitably prepared and arranged for the celebration.

Resolved further, That the joint committee heretofore appointed take such further action as may be necessary to carry out the purposes of these resolutions.

## FORTUNES FOR SAW MILL MEN

NEW MACHINE GUARANTEED TO EXTRACT SPIRITS OF TURPENTINE FROM SAWDUST.

The Jacksonville Times-Union says: That spirits of turpentine can be successfully extracted from sawdust has been demonstrated, and the Pure White Turpentine Co., of this city is now engaged in manufacturing machines for doing the work, and will supply them to sawmills cutting spirit-producing timber.

The officers of the company are H. B. Snell, president, and J. G. Gardner, vice-president and general manager. Their factory is located just north of the Georgia-Florida Ship Company at the intersection of Eighth street and Railroad avenue, Springfield. Mr. Snell is also president of the Ship Company.

The invention is the discovery of Mr. Gardner, who has devoted years of time to the work, but he has at last succeeded and has been granted patents by the United States Patent Office. For forty years others have been working to devise a method of extracting turpentine from wood, but Mr. Gardner has succeeded, and the following paragraphs of one of his patents explain what results are achieved:

**What It Will Do.**  
"This invention relates to a method and apparatus for extracting turpentine from wood, especially when the latter is in a condition of sawdust or ground up wood.

"Some of the advantages of the invention are the rapidity with which the turpentine can be extracted, and the large yield thereof. I do not destroy the dryer in the turpentine, and in this way secure a product which can be marketed for use in mixing with paints and varnishes.

"The method and apparatus can be employed for extracting other volatile and by-products from ground-up wood; one of these volatile products is methyl alcohol.

"The method employed secures turpentine and alcohol in a clean, pure condition, ready for the market immediately after leaving the apparatus or after the cessation of the process."

**Non-Poisonous Alcohol.**

The inventor claims that by his process he secures an alcohol that is not poisonous. He claims that he has found that the color of the by-products of wood is regulated entirely by the temperature used in the extraction.

The Pure White Turpentine Co. is manufacturing the apparatus to sell to sawmills cutting the long leaf or loblolly pine and the Cuban pine, and will guarantee that the machines will extract two gallons of pure spirits of turpentine from every ton of sawdust.

**Results Obtained.**

They estimate that a mill cutting sixty thousand feet of lumber per day will turn out enough sawdust to run 160 gallons of turpentine, at the low estimate of two gallons to the ton of sawdust. Estimating the value of the turpentine at 40 cents per gallon at the mill, this would give a gross income of \$64 per day, from which make a liberal estimate of \$12 per day for expenses or operation, labor, barrels, etc., and this would leave a net income of \$52 per day from what is now a waste. Taking an average of 300 working days in the year, the income for the year would be \$15,600 net, and all from a waste material.

It is also claimed that the long-leaf or loblolly pine will produce from 5 to 12 gallons of turpentine per ton, instead of 2 gallons, guaranteed by the company.

**Cost of Apparatus.**  
The cost of an apparatus with a capacity for utilizing all the sawdust from a mill cutting 60,000 feet of lumber per day, will be approximately \$9,000. Larger machines cost more, and smaller machines cost less in proportion. A machine for a mill cutting ten thousand per day would cost about \$2,500.

In addition to extracting the turpentine and other by-products from sawdust, the apparatus will extract the same from chipped-up slabs, and thus vastly increase the output of turpentine and the income of the owner.

The company manufacturing the machines sell them, but charge the persons purchasing and installing the same a royalty of 2 cents per gallon on all turpentine extracted from the sawdust and ground-up wood.

The plant for manufacturing the machines is already in operation, and several of the machines will be located very shortly, as there are already a number of applications in for them.

Mr. Snell and Mr. Gardner have a good thing in this invention.
