Metropolitan Street Railway declined a large fraction.

New York Cotton Market. New York, May 12.—The cotton market opened steady at an advance of 2 to 4 points in response to better cables, both as to futures and spot cotton in this market. Bulls were somewhat disappointed that private reports of ruin in Texas, received yesterday, were not confirmed by the official weather map, but there was support from the largest interests and prices following the call improved somewhat on their initial advance with the market in the middle of the morning steady at a net gain of 7@8 points.

ITALIAN COUNT A SHOPLIFTER

MADE OFF WITH \$1,500 DIAMOND BROOCH AND WAS CAPTURED AFTER LIVELY CHASE.

New York, May 12.—An Italian giving the name of Count Carlo is under arrest after an exciting chase through Broadway crowds. He is accused of having attempted to replenish his fortunes at the expense of a West Twenty-third street jewelry shop where he was being shown a lot of fine stones. A \$1,500 diamond brooch claimed by the shopkeeper was found in his glove.

With an impressive air and aristocratic mien Carlo strolled into the shop and stated in French that he had left his ancestral chateau days ago to make glad the heart of an American heiress whose smiles he had won on her trip abroad during the winter. All of this was preliminary to the request that he be shown something superlative, a gift for the girl. Nothing seemed quite good enough and finally the "count" was conducted to a burglar proof cage where the best selected several fine ones, chose a design for their setting and asked a salesman to accompany him to a prominent hotel where he had deposited \$10,000.

Apparently awaiting for the salesman, the "count" strolled languidly to the street. When the clerk reached the door his customer had vanished. A quick look at the jewel casket showed that one of the brooches had gone likewise. Two or three clerks rushed into the crowded street and luckily overhauled Carlo four blocks distant slowly walking along Broadway. One of them unceremoniously grasped him by the collar and called him a thief. Carlo shook him off easily and broke into a run. A crowd gathered at his heels and he was soon halted by a mounted officer.

After he had been locked up several hours, Carlo told an interpreter that he came to America three weeks ago from Monte Carlo, where he had lost \$7,000, all he possessed.

TEXAS MURDERER HANGED FRIDAY

HOLLY VAN, WHO KILLED A STOREKEEPER WHILE ATTEMPTING ROBBERY, LEGALLY PUT TO DEATH.

Dallas, Tex., May 12.—Holly Van was hanged here today for the murder last November of Sol Aronoff, keeper of a small grocery, whom Van, with a negro assistant, killed while attempting robbery. Aronoff was just in the act of closing the store about 9 o'clock that night, when Van and a negro known by the name of Burrell Oates, came into the store and called for a sack of tobacco, tendering 25 cents in payment.

Aronoff had given them the tobacco and was in the act of giving them their change when they both pulled revolvers and commanded him to hold up his hands. Mrs. Aronoff, who was in the room adjoining the store, seeing that her husband was in danger, secured his pistol and bravely rushed into the store. On her entrance the firing began. Aronoff received a wound in the left breast, which produced almost instant death.

JUNKETERS HAVE REACHED MEMPHIS

SECRETARY WILSON AND PARTY OF AGRICULTURAL EXPERTS AT TENNESSEE MEETING.

Memphis, Tenn., May 12.—Secretary of Agriculture Wilson, accompanied by Professor J. W. Spillman and M. A. Carleton, arrived from Washington in a special train over the Southern railway this morning and left for the southwestern states where an investigation of agricultural conditions is to be made. On arrival here the secretary's train was combined with one containing officials of the Rock Island system and departed soon after over that line for Little Rock, Ark., the first city in the itinerary, where addresses were to be made. It being also the plan to tell the farmers of the southwest the results of agricultural department experiments in which they are interested. The states to be visited are Arkansas, Texas, Kansas and Indian Territory and Oklahoma.

TRANSFER OF COUNT CASSINI

OFFICIALLY GAZETTED AT ST. PETERSBURG—SUCCESSOR NOT YET ANNOUNCED.

St. Petersburg, May 12.—The transfer of Ambassador Cassini from Washington to Madrid was officially gazetted under date of May 9, but the appointment of Baron de Rosen to succeed Count Cassini at Washington has not yet been gazetted.

In fact Emperor Nicholas is awaiting a formal notification that Baron de Rosen is persona grata to the United States before signing his decree of nomination. Not the slightest doubt exists here that the baron is perfectly acceptable to the government at Washington, where, besides his high reputation as a diplomat, he enjoys the personal acquaintance of not only many officials, but of President Roosevelt himself.

TWO YOUNG GIRLS DROWNED IN POND

WADED OVER THEIR DEPTH AT EAST PULASKI, VA.—BODIES HAVE BEEN RECOVERED.
