WIND ATTAINED HIGH VELOCITY

SHORTLY AFTER 5 O'CLOCK YESTERDAY AFTERNOON IT WAS BLOWING 39 MILES.

A squall which reached a high velocity, struck the port yesterday afternoon shortly after 5 o'clock, and for a few minutes vessels were tossed about in the bay as though they were chips. This especially applied to small craft, and even the big tramp steamers felt the force of the blow.

The wind began to increase in velocity from about 2 o'clock, and at 5:14 in the afternoon a sudden squall came on, when it attained the high velocity of 39 miles per hour, continuing at this rate for about five minutes. At first clouds of dust were sent into the air, but rain began to fall, and continued until the squall abated.

The weather department placed the southwest storm warning signals up shortly after 5 o'clock, which were continued during the night. But little damage was done in the harbor, especially as to the loss of timber, as but little work was being done and most of the timber was in the booms.

The weather department is of the opinion that the full force of the storm did not strike the city, but went to the northwest, as the rainfall here was comparatively light.

UPWARD MARCH OF PRICE OF SPIRITS.

The Sunday Savannah News says: The upward march of the price of spirits of turpentine was continued yesterday, the market opening firm at 60 1/2 to 60 3/4 c on sales of 115 casks, and closing steadily at 61 cents, with additional sales of 55 casks. The last advance seemed to have caused a let up in the demand for supplies, however, for no sales were reported after the close of the market. The receipts were moderate, 403 casks, and the shipments fair, 891.

The rosin market opened firm and unchanged on higher and medium grades, and an advance of 5 cents on G and below. Sales at the opening, the total for the market day, were 1,191 barrels. The close was firm and unchanged, and without further sales. Many buyers were in the market in the late trading and sales were made at varying prices all representing an advance on several grades. The best price paid was 16 cents up on N to H, inclusive, and 5 cents up on the remainder at an advance of 10 cets on I and above. The receipts were 1,082 barrels, and the shipments, 560.

New York Cotton Market.

New York, May 15.—The cotton market opened firm at an advance of 5 to 9 points on active covering and buying orders from both the South and Europe promoted by firm Liverpool cables and further private reports, claiming damage from too much rain in various sections of the belt, although the early weather map showed fairly favorable conditions for over Sunday, with no general precipitation. Leading bulls were said to be selling at the advance and prices after working up to a net gain of about 9 to 10 points, ruled irregular but showed a generally steady tone.
