JOINT MEETING OF LABOR ORGANIZATIONS

COMMITTEES FROM TWELVE UNIONS MEET AND ADOPT RESOLUTIONS ON THE GARNISHMENT BILL TO BE INTRODUCED IN THE FLORIDA LEGISLATURE.

A joint meeting of committees from twelve labor organizations of Pensacola was held last night in the hall of the Stevedore's Benevolent Association No. 1, when resolutions were adopted relative to the garnishment bill which, it is understood, will be introduced in the Florida legislature within a few days.

The meeting was held under the auspices of S. B. A. No. 1, and each union had about five delegates present. It was permanently organized by the election of Thos. Johnson as president and Thos. Tuttle as secretary.

A number of addresses were then made by the various delegates present, and afterwards a committee of three was appointed to call upon the merchants of the city who signed the petition requesting said passage of the bill. These merchants will be asked to withdraw their signatures from this paper, as it is not in the interest of the laboring classes to allow its passage if it can be prevented.

Resolutions were then adopted, and forwarded to Senator Blount and Representatives Avery and Fillingim. These resolutions were drawn up by a committee consisting of one member from each of the twelve unions represented. It is as follows:

"Whereas, There is now pending before the legislature of the State of Florida an amendment to Section 1, Article 10 of the Constitution of the State of Florida, relating to homesteads and exemptions. Be it

"Resolved, That we the representatives of the laboring classes of Escambia county, believing said amendment to be prejudicial to the interests of our class, do hereby in a mass meeting assembled of the various trades and labor organizations of our county, enter our protest against said amendment or any proposed garnishment enactments.

"Resolved, further, we earnestly request and demand of our representatives in the Florida legislature that they do all within their power to defeat this or any other proposed measure of this character, believing the present law to be a just and equitable one."

The resolution, signed by every member of the committee, which had been organized by the election of John O'Brien, chairman, and Sam Flynn, secretary, was read to the meeting

MINUTES OF THE MEETING

BETWEEN THE CONTRACTORS ASSOCIATION AND CARPENTERS AND JOINERS.

The following minutes of a meeting held between the Contractors Association and the Carpenters and Joiners, are published by request:

On May 15th, Mr. A. V. Y. Clubs, president of the Contractors Association of Pensacola, was called upon by a prominent gentleman of the city, and requested to appoint a committee from said association to meet a like committee from the Carpenters and Painters unions of the city, said committee to have power to discuss the present strike situation and to suggest ways and means by which the strike might be settled; but to have no power to bind either organization by their actions.

Mr. Clubs called the Contractors Association together and appointed a committee of the following: A. D. Alfred, Mr. Dell and Mr. Hendricks, with Mr. A. V. Clubs as chairman, and same were ordered to meet at Mr. Clubs's office on May 15th at 9 a. m.

According to instructions the committee met at the appointed time and place and was met by the committee from the unions as follows: Mr. Cade Shackelford and Mr. L. Reddenbeck, from Union 74, Mr. DeLay from Union 459, H. H. Lewis and Newton Cole from Union 107. Accompanying this committee in his official capacity was Mr. Franklin Prinley, from Tampa, Fla., secretary of the general executive board of the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America.

Meeting being called to order by Chairman Clubs, Mr. Shackelford was accorded the floor, and stated that the unions occupied the same position that they had taken at the beginning of the strike, or in other words, they wanted 8 hours per day with the same pay they had been receiving for 9 hours, and under no condition would they alter their demands.

To this Mr. Clubs replied, saying that the contractors were equally as decided in the stand they had taken, and further stated "that the committee was well aware, that we have in times past been forced to employ union men who were not competent mechanics in their line, at wages far in excess of what they were worth. This we were forced to do to carry on our work and this has cost the contractors a lot of money and is a serious matter, which could be and should be remedied at once. Also that 'stewards' have been appointed on the various jobs, not in our interest, but it seems to us, opposed to our every interest.

"Also, we made the following suggestions: That the unions pass a rule, that no new members be admitted unless having been employed by a reputable contractor, for not less than 3 months, and said workman rated and paid not less than \$2.00 per day, and that all workmen not capable of earning \$2.00 per day, shall be kept out of the unions, but allowed to work as helpers on all union jobs."

After considerable discussion as we were no nearer an agreement than when the meeting opened, an adjournment was ordered with the understanding that each committee report to their respective bodies, and that the contractors be notified if the unions desired a further conference.

At the meeting of the Contractors Association to-day the following rules were adopted:

That foremen shall be employed union or non-union, as the contractor may deem best.

The contractors will pay by the hour for all work done, not less than nine hours per day, as their interests more or less may demand.
