The following resolution was passed:

CHASED AWAY BY PIANO PLAYING

PROFESSOR OF CHICAGO UNIVERSITY DESERTS MIDWAY FOR FISHERMAN'S HUT.

Chicago, May 17.—With the desire of getting away from the neighbors who annoy him with piano playing and singing, and of living a life which he can fashion as he chooses, Oskar Eckstein, an instructor in chemical research at the University of Chicago, has deserted the neighborhood of Midway Place, and is now living in a fisherman's hut on the shore of Lake Michigan, where he prepares his own food, chooses his companions from the few fishermen that live nearby, and wears the greater part of his time a simple bathing costume.

Dislike for conveniences of all kinds and a wish to be allowed to live his own existence in his own way—these are the influences which have led the scientist to leave the pleasant apartments in Kimbark avenue for the lonely hut beside the lake.

Laws governing the eating and living habits of people, Dr. Eckstein declares, are useless. He procures whatever his fancy suggests, and eats it whenever his appetite dictates. He was born in Munich thirty-five years ago, and has traveled in many out-of-the-way parts of the globe.

FRENCH NEUTRALITY HAS NOT BEEN VIOLATED.

Queenstown, May 17.—Vice-Admiral Beresford, commanding the channel fleet, in an interview here yesterday on the arrival of the White Star line steamer Oceanic from New York May 10, said he felt France had taken care that there should be no breach of neutrality in the Far East with her consent. Possibly, he said, the Russians like others, might use French waters to repair accidents and remain there until turned out.

WORK OF THE CRIMINAL COURT

NUMBER OF CONVICTIONS WERE SECURED AND SEVERAL SENTENCES PASSED.

In the criminal court yesterday, Judge Beggs presiding, a number of convictions were made, and in addition several sentences were passed by the court.

The first case to be called was that of John R. Crockett, of Millview who was charged with having sold liquor without a license. The jury returned a verdict of guilty, but the defendant has not yet been sentenced.

Jake Williams, charged with entering without breaking with intent to commit a felony, was then arraigned, and was found guilty. He was sentenced to serve one year in the penitentiary.

W. F. Seewald, charged with attempting to obtain money by false pretenses was convicted, and sentenced to pay a fine of \$50 and costs or serve six months on the county roads.

Will Seabrook who was convicted of aggravated assault, was sentenced to pay a fine of \$50 or serve six months.

Judge Beggs passed sentence upon Della Wade, convicted of aggravated assault. She was sentenced to pay a fine of \$50 and costs or serve six months. Sarah Jones, convicted of receiving stolen property was sentenced to pay a fine of \$25 and costs or serve three months in jail.

Important Case.
One of the most important cases to come before the court will be that of Leo Lee, which will be called to-day. He is charged with manslaughter. It being alleged that he caused the death of Walter Mann some weeks ago, when the latter was struck by some party and fell to the sidewalk, the fall causing a fracture of the skull and later death.

This case will probably occupy the entire day as there are a large number of witnesses.

RECEIVER NAMED FOR GET-RICH-QUICK CONCERN.

New York, May 17.—Judge Holt has named A. R. Conkling, of this city, as receiver for the private banking firm of A. C. Wilcox & Co., which assigned a few days ago. Papers discovered at the main office by the receiver indicated that the branch banks have been utilized as banks of deposit for the little up-state communities and at the same time they provided a means of selling securities, the value of which has not yet been ascertained.

Some of the literature found in the offices indicated that \$50,000 in bonds had been issued by one Wilcox concern on a tract of land in North Carolina of five thousand acres, which was "gently rolling, sandy soil, and adapted for fruit raising or for a health resort."

Besides the health resort, the company proposed to "erect a saw mill on the land and cut the timber off a portion of the same and make it into fruit farms." Counsel for the receiver said he would try to discover whether there had been any proceeds from converting the "timber into fruit farms."

SELLING CARGO OF WRECKED ALICIA.

Key West, May 17.—The damaged goods of the Spanish ship Alicia, which was wrecked some weeks ago on the Florida reefs, were sold Friday by order of the judge of the United States court. Almost all the goods put up at auction were damaged, but brought good prices. Several merchants from New York and Chicago held the steamer Miami at Miami at a cost of \$1,000 to reach here in time for the sale, but were disappointed, as the goods offered were put up in small lots, the best and the dry goods not being offered as yet for sale. These men, after seeing the goods, left again for the north, as they wanted to buy in bulk. The sales will be continued from day to day.

A Quotation Traced.

Who wrote the words "a prospect all on fire?" They are quoted by Wordsworth in his "Evening Walk," and Professor Knight and his helpers had been unable to trace it. But Nowell Smith communicates to the Athenaeum his discovery that it comes from a long forgotten poem, "Sunday Thoughts," by Moses Browne. Moses Browne's phrase lives like a fossil in Wordsworth's poem. Browne died in 1787 and was not known to Dr. Johnson, at whose suggestion he brought out an annotated edition of the "Complete Angler." His "Sunday Thoughts" was reprinted as late as 1806. He held the living of Olney for a short time during Cowper's residence there and had John Newton for his curate.—London Globe.

LETTER RECEIVED FROM BOY MISSING A YEAR.

Pawtucket, R. I., May 17.—Mrs. Catherine Meehan, of this city, has received a letter bearing the signature of her ten-year-old son, Joseph, who has been missing since April 16, 1904. The letter was dated May 16, and was stamped in the local office at noon of that date, indicating that the boy, or the person implicated in his disappearance, is in this city. The letter was given to the police and a detective was assigned to the case in an endeavor to trace the person who posted the letter.

The letter, which Mrs. Meehan says is in the handwriting of her son, states that its author was kidnapped by a man who said he did so because the boy was very pretty, and because he had been abused by a playmate. The child could not give his abductor's name or residence, and the police thus far have made no progress in the hunt.

MANY ITALIAN TOWNS SUFFER FROM FLOOD.

New York, May 17.—Most of the rivers in Northern and Central Italy are overflowing owing to almost continuous rains during the last six days according to a Rome dispatch to the Herald. The Po has inundated the town of Moncalieri, a short distance from Turin. The inhabitants have abandoned the lower part of the town. The towns of Alessandria, Vicenza and Padua have also been flooded.

Steamer Sunk—No Lives Lost.

Detroit, Mich., May 17.—A special to the Free Press says the steamer Thomas W. Palmer was sunk in a collision with the steamer Harvard, off Stannard Rock, in Lake Superior. No lives were lost.
