## BIG STEAMER STILL AGROUND

ALTHOUGH SIX TUGS MADE AN EFFORT TO FLOAT HER DURING YESTERDAY.

The big British steamer Rio Jano, which is loaded with a large cargo of lumber and timber, is still aground in the bay off Muscogee wharf, and it is very likely that she will remain there until the tide rises to such an extent as to allow tugboats to float her.  
The vessel, which was loaded by H. Baars & Co., took on her cargo on the east side of Muscogee wharf, and Wednesday night she moved around and went under the coal shutes and filled her bunkers, preparatory to putting to sea. Later in the night she moved out into the stream, preparatory to sailing, but the steering gear went wrong and in making a turn she went hard aground on a bar.  
The engines were reversed and an effort made to back her out of the sand, but this proved ineffectual, and yesterday about six tugs spent the day in an effort to float the steamer.  
This was finally given up until high tide, when another effort will be made. It is not anticipated that the vessel is damaged to any extent.

### Epidemics of History.

In the twelfth century not less than fifteen epidemics of disease and many famines carried off the people of England. The thirteenth century saw twenty plagues and nineteen famines, while the fourteenth had a black plague or "black death," which was brought into the country from the east, caused the death of 100,000 persons in London alone, while in Europe altogether 25,000,000 people fell victims to its ravages. In 1485 the "sweating sickness" appeared in England, causing great destruction of human life. It reappeared at various intervals for a century thereafter. The last terrible visitation of the plague in England was in 1664-65, by which 100,000 lives were lost in London alone. This epidemic was followed by the great fire of 1666, which destroyed 10,000 houses, including all the most densely populated portions of the city. The rebuilding of London with some regard to sanitary laws appears to have put the first check on the epidemic diseases that had previously devastated its population.

### An Odd Wedding Custom.

A unique wedding custom prevails in Manchuria. The bride and her attendants, all mounted on stilts, proceed through the main streets of the village to the domicile of the groom, who meets the procession and conducts it to the place where the ceremony is to be performed. He and his friends are also on stilts. Social prominence is indicated not by richness of attire, but by the height of the stilts worn by the assembled guests. The higher the rank of the wedded pair the loftier the stilts they wear. If, as sometimes happens, the contracting parties are of differing social standing the effect is more than usually ludicrous.

## CHANNEL AT MIAMI NEARLY FINISHED

EIGHTY OF THE FULL ONE HUNDRED FEET WIDTH HAS BEEN CUT.

The Miami Metropolis says: After having labored both day and night under a double crew for the past ten months or more the F. E. C. dredge under the management of Capt. L. L. Dodge, and which has been cutting the channel in the bay to connect with the canal being dredged through the point of land north of Norris Cut, and forming a connection with the ocean, finishing her trip across last Saturday morning.

This, however, does not complete the work in the channel as twenty-five feet still remains to be cut in its width. The channel is now eighty feet wide and ranges from eight to ten feet in depth, but before going to work again the dredge is in need of a general overhauling and much of the machinery will be removed and sent to St. Augustine for the necessary improvements, while the dredge itself will go on the ways here for overhauling the hull, three months or more elapsing before it is again ready to resume work on the channel.

On account of the repairs the dredge was towed to the city Saturday morning and docked at the terminal dock. The Houseboat, used as a tender for eating and sleeping purposes by the crews, together with pontoons, conveyor pipes and all other material used in digging the channel, were also brought to this side and will be stored until such time as the work is resumed.

In this work the dredge has done valuable service. It has worked there incessantly by night and day, and though the strain has been heavy and constant both on the men and the machinery they have held up remarkably well without loss of time by breakdown or accident. As soon as the other twenty feet of surface substance shall have been removed from the channel, a chisel dredge will be put to work chipping up the rock now forming the bottom of the cut, to a depth of eighteen feet. This machine will be followed by a scoop dredge that will remove the rock and deposit it on the banks of the channel.

The work is slow and tedious and it may probably be two years yet before the channel has been dredged and completed to a depth of eighteen feet, but when that shall have been done Miami's commercial importance with the world will begin.
