BIG LIBEL SUIT FILED AGAINST STEAMER DAVID

VESSEL, WHICH WENT AGROUND ON EAST COAST, TAKEN INTO CUSTODY ON A SUIT OF \$25,000 FOR SALVAGE.

The American steamer David, which reached here during the latter portion of last week, with a cargo of coal for the Pensacola navy yard, was yesterday taken into custody by United States Deputy Marshal Wharton, upon a libel suit filed in the United States court. This suit amounts to about \$25,000, and is in a cause of salvage.

The vessel is lying alongside of the coal wharf at the navy yard, and was preparing to discharge her cargo when the suit was filed and the authorities took charge of her. The David is from New York, but was under charter to the navy department to bring a cargo of coal to the local yard from Norfolk. On the voyage here the vessel went aground elsewhere was disabled. The tug Martha Ellen of Jacksonville went to the rescue of the steamer, and after rendering assistance demanded salvage. The tug is owned by R. G. Ross, of Jacksonville, and the vessel was not only libeled but the cargo of coal as well, which amounts to about 1,100 tons.

Blount & Blount, as proctors for the libellants, filed the libel suit, and the necessary papers causing the seizure of the steamer were soon made out and the vessel taken into custody, a watchman being placed on board. The answer of the owners of the steamer to the suit is made returnable on June 12th.

The David was preparing to begin discharging her cargo, but the libel suit has caused this work to stop, as none of the cargo can be removed until bond has been given or the litigation settled.

NO TRACE OF STOLEN DIAMONDS

THEFT EVIDENTLY INSPIRED BY PROFESSIONAL, WHO PROMPTED EMPLOYEE TO THE DEED.

By Associated Press. New York, May 22.—No trace has been found of three diamonds worth \$90,000, reported as having been stolen about May 4th from Tiffany's work rooms. All the detectives and police officials engaged on the case are maintaining the greatest possible secrecy, but it has been learned that their efforts thus far have been in the direction of closing all the markets here and abroad where the thief might seek to dispose of the gems. While these measures may prevent the sale of the booty they also greatly accentuate the difficulty of detection.

The police are understood to have reached the conclusion that the theft was the inspiration, if not the actual execution, to a professional who prompted an employee to the deed, promising him a rich return for practically little risk.

STRIKE IN HONOLULU

JAPANESE STRIKERS HAVE QUIETED DOWN AND PEACEFUL SETTLEMENT IS EXPECTED.

By Associated Press. Honolulu, May 22.—A wireless message from Lahaina last night said that the strike situation was improved. The Japanese laborers have quieted down and will resume work next Wednesday. A peaceful settlement of the trouble is expected. A message to the Japanese consul states that the strikers were visiting the home of the Japanese contractor when the police interfered and shot three of them. Hackfeld & Co., agents of the plantation asking who shot the Japanese received reply that the men who did the shooting were in charge of Sheriff Baldwin. It was further stated that the Japanese were attacking the contractors' home.


