CITY POLITICS IS DISCUSSED

SPECIAL IN BIRMINGHAM AGE. HERALD CONCERNING LOCAL POLITICS.

A Pensacola special in the Birmingham Age-Herald of May 22 discloses the political situation in Pensacola as follows:

The political situation apparently grows more complicated daily. From the number of candidates in the field the mayorship of Pensacola would seem to be a very desirable position indeed. Aside from the white primary party with Chas. H. Bliss as the standard bearer, and the anti-primary faction headed by Cheever L. Shine, (late of Tallahassee), with Mayor Welles as god-father, there are now the republican candidate, Rix M. Robinson, and the strictly independent, running on his merits, Charles H. Wells. As something has been said regarding Messrs. Bliss and Shine, a few lines regarding the two last will not be amiss.

Robinson and Wells. Mr. Robinson, who looks to the republican voters for his strength, is a cultured, scholarly, polished gentleman, a successful business man and esteemed by all who know him. During his short term as postmaster he gave more general satisfaction than any man who has held the position in two decades. He is too clean a man to stoop to questionable methods, and will lose a large number of votes among the negro republicans for that reason. Charles H. Wells came from the wooden nutmeg state to Pensacola nearly twenty years ago. He was for many years connected with the firm of E. E. Saunders & Co., of which firm Mayor Welles is the real head. Three or four years ago, however, he severed his connection with the firm, since which time Mayor Welles and Mr. Wells have been at odds. He has a strong following and every vote cast for him in the coming election will weaken the anti just so much. He remarked to a friend some days since: "If you can't vote for me, vote for Bliss. If Bliss is elected I gain a victory."

Welles's Speech. The anti-primary party leaders are straining every nerve to work up a degree of enthusiasm but the people do not enthuse. At a meeting held in Seville square last Thursday night Mayor Welles made many charges against Mr. Bliss—that he was opposed to unionism, would not pay his debts, was addicted to sharp practices in many ways, and so on and so forth. Mr. Welles is sorry he made that speech, for it has proven the most powerful boomerang ever thrown at an opponent. In the history of political strife pervades in the city, and everywhere—even among some of the strongest adherents of the party, the sentiment was uttered next day that all the primary people had to do was to keep mum and let the heaven work. Mr. Bliss in a short time after this meeting published a cool, quiet, dispassionate article that refuted every charge. There is now displayed in the front window of a jewelry store a large board covered over with a score or more of badges, pins, insignia, etc., of various labor organizations, with this card: "Badges Showing Charles H. Bliss's connection with labor organizations."

The vessel will be in command of Captain Frank M. Dunn, who will bring her around to Pensacola, and afterwards be the commanding officer.
