UNIFORMED RANK OF THE K. OF P.

TWO COMPANIES ORGANIZED HERE BY THE COLORED MEN OF PENSACOLA.

Two companies of the colored uniform rank, Knights of Pythias, of Florida, were instituted here yesterday morning, and also a court Calanetta, each having a membership of about twenty-five.

The institution of the court occurred Wednesday night, and yesterday morning the two companies of the uniformed rank were instituted, the ceremonies occurring at the new colored K. of P. hall. The visitors here, comprising three companies of the uniformed rank, two from Jacksonville and one of Apalachicola, conducted the institution.

Afterwards about two hundred colored men in uniform paraded the streets, and then paraded to the union depot, where a special train awaited them. The event of the day was the picnic given at the new park north of the city, and it was largely attended.

Among the prominent negroes in attendance upon the meeting were Joseph L. Jones, adjutant general of the colored uniformed rank of the United States, and Brigadier General D. Taylor, of Florida.

All of the visitors will leave this morning for their homes.

RESIDENCE WAS DAMAGED

HOME OF DR. T. S. MITCHELL WAS STRUCK BY LIGHTNING YESTERDAY MORNING.

During the severe thunder and electrical storm of yesterday morning, the residence of Dr. Thos. S. Mitchell, on East Hill, was struck by lightning and damaged to a considerable extent.

It was during the worst of the storm that a bolt of lightning struck the roof of the residence, tearing away the shingles and boards, and allowing the rain to come down into the room.

The lightning, after doing considerable damage to the roof, passed into one of the rooms, where it tore a mattress to pieces and almost destroyed the furniture in the place, scattering it to all parts of the house.

Fortunately for members of the family none were in the section of the house which was struck by the lightning, and consequently none of them were injured.

A number of other residences in the immediate vicinity were struck, but sustained but little injury.

WILL DISCHARGE THE COAL CARGO

THE STEAMER DAVID IS LEAKING AND HER CARGO WILL BE DISCHARGED SOON.

The cargo of coal of the American steamer David, which arrived here recently from Norfolk is to be discharged at once, or as soon as men can be procured to take the coal from the hold of the vessel.

The David was libeled a few days ago by the owners of a tug of Jacksonville, the amount being \$25,000. This was on account of salvage claimed to be due the tug for assisting the steamer when she was in distress on the East Coast about ten days since. The cargo was also included in the libel.

Yesterday the representatives of the libelant agreed to grant the master permission to unload the cargo, as the steamer is leaking from the injuries sustained when she went aground. The extent of the leak is not known, but it is stated as being very bad, necessitating the discharge of the cargo. The vessel is moored alongside of the coal wharf at the navy yard, the cargo of coal being consigned to the government.
