GLIMPSE OF THE GOVERNOR'S HAPPY DOMESTIC LIFE.

The wife of a Florida statesman writing from Tallahassee to a Pensacola friend gives a charming glimpse of Governor Broward's domestic life that is too good to be lost in the privacy of a personal letter.

"Governor and Mrs. Broward received alone—the governor a great big overgrown, awkward boy—decidedly brunetish, almost blackish, wearing a dress suit. Mrs. Broward small, blonde—easy and natural—wore a handsome creation of soft brocade, silk (of so delicate shade I have to confess color blindness) and white chiffon—the front panel of the skirt of pleated chiffon. The bodice had loose knots of turquoise blue velvet ribbon nestling amid a fluffy arrangement of chiffon about the low cut neck."

"In the dining room a bevy of young girls and boys—chief among them the eldest daughter Miss Dorcas Broward—served cake and ices."

"In a cozy nook in the hall stood a table from which bon bons were served. Miss Douglas sister of Mrs. Broward was aided here by other young ladies. Whitefield's orchestra furnished the music."

"The cutest thing I saw during the evening was a little four year old Miss Broward with great, big black eyes, sitting in a large upholstered chair just back of her mamma and pappa while they were receiving. As her pretty black eyes closed in sleep and during a lull in the arrivals, the governor crossed the room, got a pillow and gently slipped it under her head."

"The act under the circumstances, was so sweet I almost wished my husband was the governor and I his wife and she my very own little girl. They do say the governor is a most devoted father—and to see Mrs. Broward in her home is to know that she is devoted to her girls. We are only two doors from the governor's mansion (?) and I see the mother and children a great deal. She attends to her children and keeps up social duties too. It is always busy and always happy—is so natural and unaffected always."

Isn't that a charming glimpse of the simple, unostentatious domestic life that is said to characterize the new governor of Florida whose moral and executive courage are attracting favorable attention and all eyes are watching to see if he is what he promises to be—a strong, fearless and clean governor or only a "new broom."
