THE WEATHER FOR JUNE

WHAT HAS PREVAILED IN PENSACOLA DURING THIS MONTH FOR THE PAST 25 YEARS.

The following data, covering a period of 25 years, have been compiled from the Weather Bureau records at Pensacola. They are issued to show the conditions that have prevailed, during the month-in question, for the above period of years, but must not be construed as a forecast of the month.

Temperature.
Mean or normal temperature, 80 degrees.
The warmest month was that of 1881, with an average of 82 degrees.
The coldest month was that of 1905, with an average of 76 degrees.
The highest temperature was 101 degrees on June 30, 1894.
The lowest temperature was 55 degrees on June 1, 1889.

Precipitation.
Average for month, 5.10 inches.
Average number of days with .01 of an inch or more, 10.
The greatest monthly precipitation was 14.11 inches in 1881.
The least monthly precipitation was 0.27 inches in 1901.
The greatest amount of precipitation recorded in any 24 consecutive hours was 5.89 inches on June 26 and 27, 1888.

Clouds and Weather.
Average number of clear days, 10; partly cloudy days, 14; cloudy days, 6.
Wind.
The prevailing winds have been from the southwest.
The average hourly velocity of the wind is 9.1 miles.
The highest velocity of the wind was 48 miles from the southwest on June 27, 1888.


