NEW BAPTIST CHURCH OPENED

WEST HILL MISSIONARY BAPTIST ORGANIZED SUNDAY MORNING.

Fifteen months since Rev. E. A. Cottrell, at his own expense, established a mission in the suburb of West End and with faithful preaching and good, hard work gathered the people together, concentrated their interest and efforts erected a meeting house and hopefully looked forward to the organization of a church which came to pass last Sunday.

The first church and East Hill suspended their 11 o'clock services in favor of the occasion and pastors and people went to the Park street car line landed its passengers at "Clay Pit" and a short walk on the "hard road" west brought them to the place. Mr. Cottrell, with happy face welcomed the people to a commodious building, 28x45, enclosed and finished to the ceiling. After a clear and impressive sermon on the "church a building" (text 1 Cor. 3:9) by Dr. L. D. Geiger, corresponding secretary and treasurer of State Mission, a collection of \$116.00 was taken to complete the building.

Rev. Fred Jones was called to the chair and S. Y. Pitts to the secretary's table, and with Dr. Geiger formed a presbytery, which proceeded to organize the West Hill Missionary Baptist church. Eight persons produced letters and three others took their places for organization.

The usual church covenant and articles of faith, accepted among Baptists, were subscribed to by eleven persons when the hand of fellowship and recognition was extended by the presbytery.

Mr. E. A. Cottrell was unanimously elected pastor of the church. Thus another plant is established for the glory of God, the edification of believers and the salvation of souls.

The pastor, assisted by Rev. W. F. Wagner, of DeFuniak Springs, will conduct a series of meetings day and night through the week and a cordial invitation is extended to all.

In the evening Dr. Geiger, at the First church, delivered a stirring sermon on missions in which the audience was forcibly confronted with the condition that our homes, our country, our American institutions, were not so much under the keeping of the army, navy, or national prosperity as the moral and Christian term of the nation and the real key to the situation is missions.
