



day grow on the workers began to grow weary and irritated and could not accept the jollying of any opposing worker.

Watchers Were Busy.
Watchers were busy at all of the polling places. It had been rumored that several parties were out of the city who were qualified to vote and that other persons, unknown to the inspectors, would vote in their stead. It was stated that a number of instances of this character occurred, but in each the party was detected by the watchfulness of those placed there to look after the interests of their candidates.

One Disagreeable Incident.
One disagreeable incident of the day was a fight which occurred in the afternoon near precinct 12, which, it

was stated, was participated in by Jas. H. Leath and Aaron and Hans Kelly. Mr. Leath stated afterwards that Aaron Kelly had abused him for nothing, calling him vile names, and nothing when he was being choked afterwards when he was being choked by a police officer, that several parties placed revolvers in his face, and in addition beat him over the head, and the officers did not interfere. Shortly after the affray commenced a big crowd gathered, but scattered when they saw a revolver in the grasp of Leath. Several officers appeared, but none seemed too anxious to interfere. Leath was arrested by some police officers and Deputy Sheriff Saunders and taken to the police station, where he gave bond in the sum of \$125. Aaron and Hans Kelly were also arrested.

Much Interest Shown.
Last night the greatest interest was manifested by every resident of the city. The telephone at The Journal was kept ringing constantly, and great crowds gathered there to hear the returns as they came into the office. All along Palafox street, especially where the bulletins were being posted, crowds congregated, and when the bulletins from a precinct showing Bliss to be in the lead were read out, there was loud and prolonged cheering. The crowds were evidently with the Primary people and expressed themselves when the good news was heard.

Many prominent men were seen about the polls during the day. Hon. Chas. H. Bliss was one of the first to be seen. Later Mayor Welles and Comptroller Geo. T. Morgan could be seen circulating among the voters. Hon. Rix M. Robinson was also in evidence, but did not confine his work to the polls. Many of the most prominent men of the city were at work, especially those in favor of the White Primary. This was especially noticeable among the young men of the city, who worked like trojans in favor of White Supremacy.

Vote Was Heavy.
The vote polled at the various precincts during the day was exceptionally heavy, notwithstanding the fact that many persons, especially negroes, were unable to cast their ballots. Many did not have their poll taxes paid, while others could not mark their tickets. In some instances it was stated that other negroes would endeavor to vote the ticket of those who could not read, but in each instance they were detected by those stationed there for just such a purpose.

YOUNG MAN KILLED BY BITE OF SPIDER.

Quitman, Ga., June 6.—Walter Phillips, the 20 year old son of Mr. F. Phillips, who lives three miles west of town, was stung by some insect, supposed to be a spider, this morning about 6 o'clock, death resulting in about four hours.
The bite caused him great pain at once, and he died a few hours later in great agony. Medical assistance was summoned, but the physicians could do him no good.

COMMISSION HAS NOT YET ARRIVED

THOS. F. BRITSON WIRES REGARDING HIS COMMISSION AS CUSTODIAN.

Although over a month has elapsed since the state senate confirmed the appointment of Thos. F. Britson as timber custodian, that official has not yet been able to assume charge of his duties, and the office is still held by Joseph Brown.

Mr. Britson yesterday wired to C. H. Dickinson, secretary to the Governor, asking why it was that he had not received his commission. In reply the following starting telegram was received:

"Tallahassee, Fla., June 6, 1905.
"Thos. F. Britson, Pensacola, Fla.
"What position were you appointed for? Wire at once."
"C. H. DICKINSON,"
Secretary."

Mr. Britson replied last night as follows:
"Pensacola, Fla., June 6, 1905.
C. H. Dickinson, Secretary, Tallahassee, Florida.
"Elected by the people, appointed by the Governor and confirmed by the senate as timber custodian. Where's that commission?"

CAMP NAMED IN HONOR OF GENERAL STAFFORD.

Baton Rouge, June 6.—Governor Blanchard has issued an order naming the encampment to be held at Alexandria "Camp Stafford," in honor of General Leroy Stafford, who went out in 1861 from Rapides Parish as Captain of Company B, Ninth Louisiana Regiment; subsequently became part of Lee's army in Virginia, rose to the rank of Brigadier-General, and commanded a brigade of Louisiana troops at the bloody battle of the Wilderness, where he was killed.

He was one of the state's most conspicuous soldiers, and as the encampment will be held in Rapides Parish, where he lived, it is appropriate that it should be called Camp Stafford.

Major General D. T. Stafford, commanding the Louisiana State National Guard, is a son of General Leroy Stafford, and wears the sword his father wore when he was killed at the battle of the Wilderness. The governor's idea is that the encampment at Alexandria is named in joint honor of the father and son—once a general officer in the Confederate army, the other a general officer at this time in the State National Guard.

BATTLESHIPS SAIL FOR SOUTHERN DRILL GROUNDS.

Norfolk, Va., June 6.—The first division of the battleship squadron under command of Rear Admiral R. D. Evans, composed of the flagship Maine, Kearsarge, Kentucky and Missouri, sailed from Hampton Roads Monday for the Southern drill grounds. After two days' evolutions at sea the squadron will sail for New York and the ships will then disperse for repairs at the Southern navy yards.
