## SURGEON GENERAL WYMAN WILL VISIT LEPERS.

Yesterday was the hottest day of the year in Pensacola, and many persons who were compelled to be out in the sun felt the excessive heat. The thermometer began to rise early in the forenoon, and at 7 o'clock had reached 89 degrees. At 2:30 o'clock in the afternoon it reached its highest point, 93 and 7:19 degrees.  
The hottest day ever experienced in June was in 1904 when the thermometer reached 101 degrees.

## Drinking Hot Water.

There are four classes of persons who should not drink large quantities of hot water: First, people who have irritability of the heart. Hot water will cause palpitation of the heart in such cases. Second, persons with dilated stomachs. Third, persons afflicted with sour stomachs. Fourth, persons who have soreness of the stomach or pain induced by light pressure. These rules are not for those who take hot water simply to relieve thirst, but as a means of washing out the stomach. Hot water will relieve thirst better than cold water and for that purpose is not to be condemned. But hot water is an excitant and in cases in which irritation of the stomach exists should be avoided.

In the fourteenth century people lived in mud huts, with a rough door and no chimney. It was not till a century later that the erection of a chimney was considered more than an indulgence in luxury, a fire commonly being built against the mud plastered wall of the hut and the smoke escaping through the roof.
