A COLLECTION FOR THE POPE

BISHOP ALLEN ISSUES AN APPEAL FOR FUNDS FOR SUPPORT OF HIS HOLINESS.

Rev. Father Fullerton, of St. Michael's Catholic church, has received the following appeal for funds with which to support the Supreme Pontiff, from Bishop Allen, of Mobile:

Although governing the Church of God but a short time, Pope Pius X has already won the esteem and love of the faithful throughout the world. His saintly character, his zeal for religion, and above all his Christian charity, has drawn all hearts to him. While we love and revere him for his personal qualities, we reverence him above all because he is the Vicar of Jesus and His representative here on earth who is the infallible Guide, appointed to lead the faithful in the paths of holiness, virtue and truth. We trace the long line of Sovereign Pontiffs back to unbroken succession from Pius X to Peter—the Prince of the Apostles, and the present venerable Pontiff inherits all the rights, powers and prerogatives vested in St. Peter, the first Pope. He is the Shepherd of the flock, who has entrusted His flock, the one for whom Christ prayed that his faith might never fail, so that "being converted himself he might ever confirm his brethren" in the faith. As our spiritual Father our relations with him are most direct and intimate. It is our duty, therefore, to help him in his world wide work of governing the church and extending its missions.

In former ages the patrimony of St. Peter was available for the support of the Supreme Pontiff but, in modern times, he has been sacrilegiously deprived of this, and, in consequence, is forced to depend on the charity of his spiritual children in every land.

Last January his Excellency, the Apostolic Delegate, Mons. D. Falconio, wrote thanking you, in the name of his Holiness, for the offerings given in 1904, and imparting a special blessing to all who contributed. He stated that: "Notwithstanding the generous response of the American people, the financial condition of the Holy See is far from being prosperous or satisfactory. The present state of the most prosperous nations of Europe and the increased demands on the funds of the Church, are the principal causes of the actual financial situation of the Holy See—a situation on which our Holy Father looks with alarm, because unless his children come forward more liberally to his assistance, notwithstanding the most rigid economy practiced in every department, he can hardly meet the exigencies of the vast administration of the Church."

Please read this letter to your faithful people and urge them to respond generously to the appeal.
