SHADWICK BARDWELL AND WILL TATOM TO SERVE TEN YEARS AT HARD LABOR.

Two convicts, Shadwick Bardwell and Will Tatom, who have been in the county jail for the past four months on motions for new trials and appeals, were yesterday taken in custody by an agent of Varn Bros. and escorted to the convict camp of that firm, where they will serve the next ten years of their life.

Bardwell, it will be remembered, was convicted some months ago of assault with intent to murder. He struck the little son of H. H. Thornton on the head with a big stick, rendering the boy unconscious. For this he was convicted and sentenced to serve ten years in the penitentiary.

Tatom was convicted at the same term of court of highway robbery, and will serve the same number of years as Bardwell.

Photographs of both convicts were made recently and yesterday they were measured and sent out to begin their long term.

Diseases of Animals. Household pets are susceptible to a far greater variety of diseases than most people imagine. Parrots are known to be susceptible to a disease so peculiar to themselves that it is called from the Greek word for parrot, "psittacosis." A number of fatal cases in human beings of what was at first supposed to be a malignant influenza pneumonia were in Paris traced to the bacillus at present thought to be causative of the parrot disease. A certain proportion of parrots are known to die from tuberculosis. Cats are known sometimes to have tuberculosis, and that they have in many cases been carriers of diphtheria and other of the ordinary infections directly and indirectly is more than suspected.—Kansas City Journal.

How Sparrows Were Caught. In an old game book published in England in 1820 appeared the following formula for the lessening of the sparrow pest: "Take some lees of wine and hemlock juice, temper them together and steep a quantity of wheat therein for the space of one night. Then place the same in a spot where the birds resort to feed, and when they have eaten thereof they will drop down dead drunk. Too much hemlock should not be used or there will be a danger of poisoning the birds and rendering them unwholesome food."
