The royal procession with the house party at Windsor castle consisted of eight carriages, preceded by scarlet liveried outriders with postillions in the Ascot state livery, dark blue and gold. The course was reached in a drizzling rain, but an immense crowd gathered to welcome the royal family.

Ambassador Reid and the staff of the American embassy went from London to Ascot in automobiles. Many Americans are staying in the vicinity. The guests of the duke and duchess of Roxburgh include Mr. and Mrs. George Cavendish Bentinck, Mr. and Mrs. Anthony J. Drexel are entertaining a house party, while Consuelo, duchess of Manchester, Mrs. John Jacob Astor and others are staying in the neighborhood.

Among the Americans invited to the royal inclosure today were Mrs. Ogden Mills and the Misses Mills, Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Townsend, Jr., and Mrs. Eldridge T. Gerry, Mrs. F. J. Mackay, Colonel and Mrs. Thompson and Mr. and Mrs. Stephen P. Hilditch. The sold vase, valued at 200 sovereigns, given by King Edward, was again carried off by Bachelor's Button, last year's winner of this event, ridden by Maher, the American jockey. Mark Twain was second and Hammerkop third. Ten horses started.

POLICE AND POPULACE COLLIDE IN GERMANY.

Cologne, Germany, June 20.—A serious collision occurred last night between the police and the populace of Chlodwigs Paiz. The police received orders for the eviction of a tenant who was behind in the payment of rent for his house. An enraged crowd numbering thousands assembled and some of the tenants of neighboring houses threw stones and other objects at the police from the windows, while the crowd in front of the delinquent tenant's residence made riotous demonstrations. Finally the police drew their swords and dispersed the crowd but not before the rioting had lasted six hours. About 20 persons were wounded, two of them being severely injured.

TELEPHONE MANAGERS IN SESSION AT CHICAGO.

By Associated Press. Chicago, June 20.—The ninth annual convention of the National Interstate Telephone association opened here to-day and will continue until Thursday. The delegates will endeavor to effect a strong central organization, which will result in complete harmony, extending throughout the entire independent system. The possibility of establishing an independent company in New York City is an important question which will come before the convention. Members of the association on Thursday will make observation trips for study and rest. Thursday evening the association will attend a banquet at the Auditorium hotel.

AN INTERESTING TREE.

The Shellbark Hickory is a Rugged Native American. The shellbark hickory is perhaps the most interesting tree we have, because it is a strictly American tree and so wedded to its native soil that it refuses to become a citizen of any other country. In the sturdiness of its roots and trunk, in the boldness in which it flings out its tough branches, in its strong individuality of character and in its general fruitfulness, not forgetting its uncounted roughness of bark, it further manifests its strong Americanism. Its winter buds are large and interesting. Early in spring the dark brown outer scales fall away. The inner scales then lengthen to protect the growing leaf, sometimes attaining a length of five inches. These inner scales are marvels of beauty both in texture and in color. The body of the scale is thick and leathery, while its surfaces, especially the inner, are soft, with a silken nap gorgeously dyed in yellow, orange and red, suggesting the chimney corner and the heat which flows from a hickory log.—Frank French in Scribner's.

Queer Lot of Names. Miss Death was brought to the German hospital in Philadelphia to be operated upon for appendicitis. She was a daughter, she said, of an undertaker. The name of the surgeon who was chosen to perform the operation was Dye—Dr. Frank Hackett Dye. When the operation was over Miss Death was placed in charge of two nurses. Miss Payne is the day nurse; Miss Grone is the night nurse. The patient recovered rapidly, and in a short time bade good-by to Dr. Dye, Miss Payne and Miss Grone.—Fuel.

PAPER SHOWS UP TEACHERS

NEW YORK WORLD UNEARHTS SCHEME OF PRIVATE TUTORING ON GRAFT PRINCIPLES.

New York, June 20.—Remarkable charges that several teachers in the Wadleigh high school in West 114th street, have used their positions to increase their incomes through unnecessary private tutoring are being formulated, according to the World. Parents of some of the girl students assert that several hundred dollars a week have been exacted in fees at the rate of \$2 an hour, it being intimated that students' markings were purposely tampered with and that they were purposely marked "backward" when they are actually proficient.

The school is a public institution. Most of the pupils prepare there for the teachers training school. The course was recently lengthened by the board of education from three to four years. The cherished hope of nearly every Wadleigh student is to teach in Manhattan. Unless they can get their certificates at the school, they are compelled to take a course in the state normal school and later pass a difficult examination.

An investigation privately made by the father of one girl whose "backwardness" in algebra alleged private tutoring indicated, he alleges, that out of 3,200 pupils ten per cent have been declared "backward" in some study and pay an average of \$1.75 an hour for "private" tutoring. The authorities in charge of the high school indignantly deny the charges.

UPHOLDS ITS ACTION IN DISSOLVING UNION.

Christiania, Norway, June 20.—The address to King Oscar and the riksdag adopted by the storting yesterday and the Swedish people generally, in reply to the long letter which the king sent June 13 to the president of the storting, M. Berner, is of a conciliatory character. At the same time, however, it indicates the unalterable determination of the storting to adhere to the action taken in dissolving the union with Sweden.

LOITERING LAW WILL NOW BE ENFORCED.

The ordinance regarding the loitering of women about saloons will now be strictly enforced by the officials, and not only the women will be held responsible, but the saloon keepers as well.

The saloons were notified yesterday by Captain Fondell that hereafter no women would be allowed either in the saloons or upon the premises, and that the custom of having private rooms for women must be abolished. All of the saloons were given notification, and although this has been a law for a number of years, it has never been enforced.


