MUCH INTEREST IN THE MEETING

CONSIDERABLE ENTHUSIASM IS MANIFESTED OVER RUSSIAN EMPEROR'S RESPONSE TO DELEGATION FROM THE ZEMSTVO REGARDING ASSEMBLY.

St. Petersburg, June 21.—Great public interest was taken in the meeting of the St. Petersburg council to-day at which the report of the delegation from the Russian congress of Zemstvos and mayors which was received in audience by the Emperor, was communicated to the council. All present rose to their feet when the Emperor's response was read and considerable enthusiasm was manifested.

Acting Mayor Reerezoff commenting on the report said in view of the imperial words there was no longer room for suspicion or skepticism. The Russian public can now be sure the plan for national representation will soon be introduced without distinction of class, faith or nationality.

In one province the governor called a special meeting of the zemstvo and read the Emperor's discourse, and it is possible that this procedure will be adopted by other governments instead of a reorganization of the zemstvo congress.

G. T. MORGAN'S STATEMENT

SAYS THAT HE IS NOT IN ANY WAY CULPABLE, AND IS READY FOR TRIAL AT ONCE BY THE COUNCIL.

Geo. T. Morgan, the city comptroller, who has held that position for a number of years, was seen last night by a Journal reporter, and asked regarding his removal from office by Mayor Bliss upon the three specifications as published in the council proceedings.

Mr. Morgan preferred not to talk upon the matter, and refused to answer a number of questions regarding the issuance of warrants for fraudulent claims, or specifications, from the city, and not having a proper bond. He stated, however, that when the council convened to-day that he would be ready for trial and then would present his side of the case to the aldermen, who would sit as a court.

Upon being requested to give out a statement, Mr. Morgan said:

"I do not care, at present, to discuss any of the matters contained in these charges or specifications. I have read the charges submitted by the mayor, and I do not see that under them I am in any way culpable, but I do not desire to attempt to prejudice the minds of the trial court of aldermen in advance. I will be ready for trial to-morrow, when the council convenes, and I will then produce my testimony, and not before."

NUMBER OF PRISONERS ENTER PLEAS OF GUILTY.

A number of prisoners went before Judge E. D. Beggs, of the criminal court yesterday afternoon and entered pleas of guilty to the charges against them. The prisoners and the sentences imposed were as follows:

John Thomas, gambling, \$10 and costs or 45 days.

Frank Edmunds, public use of obscene and indecent language, \$10 and costs or 30 days.

Katie Jordan, assault and battery, \$10 and costs or 45 days.

In the case of George Williams, who was convicted in September of being an employee of a gambling house and fined \$500 and costs, the court allowed the defendant to pay a fine of \$175, he having served nine months in jail.

TOURING IN RUSSIA.

The Difficulties of One Who Cannot Speak the Language.

Nijni Novgorod, where the great Russian fair is held, far on toward the frontier of Asia, I found the most difficult proposition in all Europe from the standpoint of the traveler seeking rest and refreshment. I knew only one word in Russian, "vodka," and one can pronounce that too often. Nobody seemed to speak anything but Russian. I could not get a cabman to take me to a hotel. One inviolable after another would pick me up, seem to understand and then take me to a shop, a steamship pier, a private residence. I was reduced to the humiliating necessity of making pictures of hotels, beds and food of all sorts—and quite without avail. At last, bethinking myself that the trade of Russia was in German hands, I started out afoot in search of any mercantile looking person with close cropped blond beard and spectacles. Such a man I found, and he directed me in German to a traktir, where I had breakfast with the aid of more crude cartooning. "Coffee" is good Volapuk, and the waiter understood me at once, but I had to sketch a number of optical figures in my notebook and finally make a spirited drawing of the common or garden hen before he knew I wanted "eggs."

For dinner that night I went to a restaurant overlooking the Volga. It is one of my most baffling memories of travel that when in my thirst I made the sign of drinking and pointed to the river the waiter lowered a bucket out of the window into the stream and brought it to me filled with rich brown water.—New York Mail.

THE PRICE OF TORTURE.

Eighteenth Century Punishments and the Costs Thereof.

Among the monuments of superstition which exist to this day, the traveler sees the "witch towers," the torture chambers and the collections of instruments of torture in various towns on the continent—notably at Nuremberg, Ratisbon, Munich and the Hague. But perhaps nothing brings the system more vividly before us than the executioner's tariffs still preserved. Four of these may be seen in the library of Cornell university and among them especially that issued by the archbishop elector of Cologne in 1757. On four printed folio pages, it enumerates in fifty-five paragraphs every sort of hideous cruelty which an executioner could commit upon a prisoner, with the sum allowed him for each, and for the instruments therein required. Typical examples from this tariff are the following:

A Hanging Bridge.

When the Denver and Rio Grande prepared to build through the Rockies engineers said the canyon of the Arkansas could never be penetrated its entire length. There was one spot in this awe inspiring chasm where there was not room for a roadbed on either side of the stream. The walls of the canyon came down to the swift current of the Arkansas without foothold for a man on either side. But an engineer suggested a hanging bridge suspended between the walls of the canyon. The bridge was built with supports imbedded in the solid rock, and across it the heavy transcontinental trains flit daily, with nothing but the slender ironwork between the river and the top of the canyon, 2,600 feet above. Great iron braces, which look almost spider-like in the vastness of the gorge, being anchored securely in the sheer sides. Huge cables depend from these braces, holding a long iron bridge, which extends not across but parallel with the course of the river.—New York Tribune.

BIG PACKING COMPANY FOUR MILLION IN DEBT

Property of International Claims Ordered Sold to Satisfy Obligations Under Foreclosure.

Chicago, June 21.—The property of the International Packing Company has been ordered sold under foreclosure proceedings to satisfy claims of \$3,977,000.

The company was formed a dozen years ago to take over the business of several of the smaller concerns at the stock yards. It is the original combination in the packing industry, but was the holder in trust of most of the companies. The Illinois Trust and Savings bank represented that no interest had been paid on the \$2,500,000 bond issue since 1898, and sought to have the mortgage foreclosed. Minority interests made charges of fraud and sought by an injunction to prevent the sale. The stockholders also entered the fight.

For 200 years these "Assassins," as they called themselves, continued to be the terror of the country. Whenever their chief, the "Old Man of the Mountain," considered himself injured he dispatched some of his assassins secretly to murder the aggressor. This is the origin of our use of the word assassin for a secret murderer.
