ANXIOUS FOR TEST OF LAW

JACKSONVILLE BASEBALL ASSOCIATION DESIRES TO HAVE QUESTION SETTLED WITHOUT DELAY—MUCH INTEREST MANIFESTED IN OUTCOME.

Considerable interest is being manifested in the city over the outcome of the question of Sunday baseball playing since the Ministerial Alliance has taken up the matter and requested County Solicitor W. J. Bryan to enforce the law recently passed making it unlawful to play this and other games on the Sabbath day, says the Jacksonville Metropolis.

J. D. Burbridge, secretary, and J. B. Lucy, manager, of the Jacksonville baseball team, were seen by a Metropolis reporter to-day and asked what, if any, action they intended taking. Mr. Lucy said that the management of the baseball team desired to have the question settled at once, and that they were anxious to test the constitutionality of the law. Judge W. B. Young, one of the best authorities on constitutional law, and Attorney Crowwell Gibbons are counsel for the baseball association, and both of these well-known lawyers are sanguine that the law is unconstitutional. In speaking about the matter, Mr. Lucy said that there was no occasion for further delay on the part of the authorities if they were going to take any action; that the county solicitor could file a writ of prohibition in the criminal court, and the case be settled then and there. Mr. Lucy said further that it was not the intention of himself or associates to violate the law, but that they were legally advised that the law would not hold good, and they wanted the thing settled so that they would know just what to do. Bearing directly upon the subject is a case at Newark, N. J., of which Sporting Life says: "Sunday bicycle racing and Sunday baseball received official indorsement at Newark, N. J., on the 7th inst., when Judge Sweeney discharged the lessee, manager and employees of the Vailsburg bicycle track, who were arrested several weeks ago by direction of Chief Adams, of the police department, to test the Sunday closing laws. In dismissing the formal charge made by Chief Adams, Judge Sweeney declared that the attempt to invoke absolute blue law was to be coldly frowned upon as contrary to good morals. He declared that the most eminent Christian Socialists and students of social economy and prominent clergymen of all faiths agreed that the innocuous Sunday amusements were conducive to good citizenship and good morals, and therefore should be officially supported. Thirty thousand persons were at the ball game at Electric Park last Sunday," said the judge, "but not a single arrest was made, nor was any disorder reported while there were three attempted murders in as many different sections of the city in backyards of homes."

TO PERPETUATE NAME OF GRAND ARMY OF REPUBLIC Society of Sons of G. A. R. Organized in Denver With Membership Roll of One Hundred. By Associated Press. Denver, Colo., June 21.—For the purpose of perpetuating the name of the Grand Army of the Republic, a society called the Sons of the G. A. R. has been called in this city. One hundred names have been placed on the charter roll. The society will be extended to all cities and towns as rapidly as possible. The requirements for membership is that a man must be a direct descendant to one who has fought in the civil war. Leo W. Kennedy, of Denver, has been chosen president, and William C. Fergil, state curator, secretary.

THREE HANGINGS IN FLORIDA SET FOR JULY 21. The Jacksonville Metropolis says: Friday, the 21st day of July, will be a hangman's day in Florida. Gov. Broward has set apart that day for three negro offenders against the majesty of the law, who have been tried and convicted by a jury of their countrymen and held to be guilty of the capital crime of murder in the first degree in each case—to pay the extreme penalty of the law and give up their lives upon the gallows in expiation of the heinous crimes which they committed. The condemned men are: Fred Cook, who committed murder in Marion county; Reuben Reed, in Clay county; and Alexander Webster, in Bradford county. Death warrants for the execution of these men—Cook in Ocala, Reed in Green Cove and Webster in Starke—on the 21 of July, have been issued from the executive office and forwarded to the sheriffs of the respective counties.
