AN ENGLISHMAN AT PORTLAND

NOVELIST EDMUND MITCHELL PAYS HIGH TRIBUTE TO THE BEAUTY OF THE EXPOSITION AND CALLS IT "THE GREATEST EPIC IN ALL THE GLORIOUS STORY OF NATIONAL EXPLORATION."

Special to The Journal. Portland, June 22.—One of the earliest visitors to the Lewis and Clark Exposition was Edmund Mitchell, the well-known English novelist, who is spending a month at Portland studying the fair. In an article regarding the Exposition Mr. Mitchell writes as follows:

"Assuredly no preceding World's Fair was set amid surroundings that could compare for natural beauty with those of the Lewis and Clark Centennial Exposition at Portland. Chicago had its lake, Paris its river, St. Louis its undulating woodlands. But Portland combines all three features of lake and river and woodland, besides its own distinctive and surpassing charms—an emerald-green sweep of valley; on the one side lofty snow-capped peaks, fifty miles away but looking wonderfully close at hand; on the other side, nearer as to form part of the Exposition picture, mountain spurs clothed with the rich growth of the forest primeval. So we have here a landscape that is not only of exquisite loveliness but of sublime grandeur as well. And nestled amid trees and shrubs, the stately palaces of white, with their rich red roofs in the old Mission style, give an added and perfectly harmonious touch of beauty to the scene.

"Of the grand historical achievement the Exposition commemorates there is no need here to write. During the months that have preceded the opening of the Fair every newspaper in the land has dealt at length with the expedition of Capt. Mortimer Lewis and William Clark, which was sent very early in 1803, reached the Columbia river in 1805 and by right of discovery added to our country's territory the first wide stretch of its Pacific coast empire. The Lewis and Clark expedition is the greatest epic of all in the glorious story of our national exploration, and it is well in these modern days of commercial rush, that the event on its hundredth anniversary should be recalled to all men's minds by a befitting celebration.

"The fair city of Portland, out of love and honor for the gallant and indomitable men, who opened the north-west to American civilization has appropriately taken upon herself this truly patriotic duty. That she has discharged the preliminaries right well, that she has prepared on one of the very scenes of the travelers' explorations a beautiful commemorative city within whose walls citizens of all the states may foregather to plead continued prosperity to their common heritage, will be the verdict of everyone who has come to participate in the opening proceedings of the Lewis and Clark Centennial Exposition and has made a first tour of the grounds and palaces. May the Exposition flourish in the cordial sentiment of every visitor, and that this result may be attained summer holiday makers all over the land have only to learn of the good things that await them should they turn their steps toward the Northwest and Portland.

"While the Portland Exposition may fairly be described as a pocket edition of either the Chicago or the St. Louis Exposition, it is by no means a little venture. Nor indeed is there any real detriment in the fact that its acreage is greatly smaller and in general scheme vastly less ambitious. Men who spent months at the bigger expositions came away with the consciousness that not one-half of the wonders displayed had been seen. While those with only weeks at their command had simply to make the choice between specializing in a few departments or scampering around without serious attempt to study any single thing. Its bewildering magnitude was the most serious reproach attaching to the St. Louis World's Fair. But at Portland we have St. Louis' 1,240 acres reduced to 182, with a water area of 220 acres thrown in. Just to gladden the eye and delight the soul without giving the peripatetic observer aching feet and jaded limbs. In comparison the Portland Exposition grounds are small, but they are quite big enough, and the visitor tackles the fair with a good heart for he has the reasonable chance of seeing it right through and of carrying away a complete and accurate picture instead of impressions hopelessly blurred."

CACTI FOR CATTLE

New Spineless Species Will Be of Great Benefit to Cattlemen in Desert Country.

Special to The Journal. Denver, Colo., June 22.—No discovery in recent years has aroused more interest, and speculation in Colorado than Luther Burbank's development of the spineless cactus. Colorado cattle growers, especially those in the southern parts of the state, have long been using the ordinary cacti of the plains as a stock food, first burning off the spines and then pounding the remainder to an easily digested pulp. The cattlemen have found that the cactus treated in this way is one of the finest flesh producing foods known, its value being especially great in a land developed only to alkali and sagebrush and shimmering sandy seas. The labor involved in removing the spines however, has largely hindered the use of the cactus as a food product, and as a result, Burbank's spineless variety will be introduced into the state as soon as possible. The Colorado State Realty Association, through its agricultural committee, has ordered a supply of the seeds and plants from the California wizard, and on their arrival will start an experimental farm to determine whether the new product can be readily transplanted to Colorado soil. The state agricultural college, also, has taken up the same subject, and is preparing to start six farms in various localities in the state with the same end in view. The new spineless cactus will be tested exhaustively under the conditions which prevail in this state, and if it will really stand investigation under Colorado conditions, as is claimed, the advantage to the stockmen of the state will be of untold value.
