IMPROVEMENTS ON EAST HILL

LARGE AREA OF GROUND HAS BEEN CLEARED UP AND IT ADDS TO ATTRACTIVE NESS OF THAT POPULAR SECTION.

Since The Journal has brought attention to the naturally beautiful location of the large area extending from the electric railway to the water front on Bayou Texar, there have been many places cleared up which exemplify the sound reasoning of those who are seeking locations for future homes in this charming section.

North of Bayview Park there has been a large area cleared up by private owners which transforms a black-jack scrub into a beautiful grove. This is certainly an object lesson of what the city might and should do to a fuller extent with Bayview Park.

These beautiful grounds have cost the city nothing and with a moderate expenditure could be made available as a pleasure resort for the entire city. With the park put in a reasonable good state of improvement we should expect the Electric Railway Company would find it to their interest to extend their line into the park; otherwise private parties are ready and willing to make an investment that will insure the public convenience and a profitable return on the expenditure.

In other directions improvements and clearings are made to such an extent as to give a fine view of the water front from the cars moving along Sixteenth avenue. The electric car line that was extended through this section but little more than a year ago by the enterprise of a few citizens has not only been profitable to those who engineered it and to the Electric Railway Co., but it has brought up the values of the entire section by making it available for home sites, and there can be no doubt, but that the entire section will be the most desirable in the city for future residence. This fact is being fully appreciated by many citizens, who are securing locations as the published real estate transfers from day to day will fully demonstrate.

 Brent, June 24.—The local showers are still passing elsewhere than over our parching fields and dying crops. Weakly sprinkles seem to be our established weekly rainfall now.
 It is claimed that this is the first drouth which has not been followed by copious rains in West Florida.
 The new "plant" at Goulding grows immensely through the severest drouth though planted on a barren waste of black-jack sand. It belongs to the order Resini Turpentine. It probably sprang from spores of the flying dust raised in excavating the far off Panama canal. About the first of May the ground was cleared and broken. Immense sheds were quickly built and the trunk line of the L. & N. tapped for turpentine. The "flow" has been truly wonderful, through all this "dry time."
 The sheds are filling with car loads of turpentine in barrels, and three immense iron tanks are being placed with a diameter of 42 feet, and 25 feet high.
 I am delighted to learn that the Rural street car line will shortly be started from the heart of the city to run northward through the booming industrial section which is growing with marvelous rapidity.
