RUSSIANS DELIBERATELY SANK BRITISH STEAMER. Removed Mails and Provisions from Ikohona and Then Fired on Her Until She Went Down.

By Associated Press. Signapore, June 27.—The captain of the British India Steam Navigation company's steamer Ikohona, which was sunk by the Russian cruiser Tereg on June 5, fifteen miles north of Hong Kong, and the crew landed here Saturday night by the Dutch steamer Perlack, says:

"The Terek sent an officer to the Ikohona, who declared that my vessel must be destroyed because she was carrying contraband. I went on board the Terek and protested strongly, but vainly. My officers and crew were transferred to the Terek and after an unsuccessful attempt to dynamite the Ikohona the Russians fired on her for two hours and sank her. They had previously removed a quantity of provisions and the mails besides all my papers."

HONDURAN FLAG HERE

SCHOONER FLYING THE FLAG OF THAT COUNTRY ARRIVED IN PORT WITH A CARGO OF FRUIT AND WILL LOAD LUMBER.

The first vessel flying the Honduran flag is now in port, having arrived Monday from Belize with a cargo of fruit. The vessel is a trim and neat schooner, and made the voyage in exceptionally quick time.

The fact that a vessel flying the flag of that country had entered port caused considerable interest along the bay front, especially as it was the first ever seen in Pensacola. The schooner came up the harbor and went alongside the wharf, with the expectation of disposing of the fruit, but this has been hard to do inasmuch as she brought only bananas and coconuts. Of the former there are about 1,000 bunches and about 2,000 coconuts. These will be disposed of, however, before the vessel leaves her wharf, and it is expected that she will load out a cargo of lumber for Honduras.
