BOARD OF SAFETY HELD REGULAR MEETING

Heard Reports of Officers, and Instructed City Electrician to Proceed With New Patrol Alarm System.

The regular meeting of the Board of Public Safety was held last night. Chairman Ingraham presiding, and Mayor Pro Tem Maura and Messrs. White, Oliver and McLaughlin present.

Marshal Schad's monthly report was then submitted. It showed that 385 arrests had been made during the month, of which 86 had been discharged, 288 found guilty and 13 sent to the criminal court.

Chairman Ingraham announced that he had appeared before the council and asked for the appropriations for a separate patrol alarm, two extra firemen and \$250 for incidentals, which had been granted.

The application of W. M. Taylor for a position in the fire department, was read and referred to the chief.

The resignation of Officer A. E. Kelly from the police department, was read and accepted.

Officer O. Collins also tendered his resignation, but it was laid on the table.

To Commence Installation. Since the council had granted the board's request for an appropriation sufficient to install a separate patrol system, the board instructed City Electrician LeBaron to proceed at as early a date as possible with the installation of the system.

The matter of locating and placing more fire alarm boxes was also taken up and discussed, and resulted in a committee composed of Mr. White and Chief Bicker being appointed to select the locations and number of boxes needed.

Mayor Pro Tem Maura brought up the question of weighing all feed purchased by the city for stock, and said that some means should be devised whereby such could be done.

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The Police Uniforms. Owing to the fact that police officers frequently resign or get discharged, leaving the city to pay any balance that may be due upon their uniforms, the board decided that as soon as the present uniforms were paid for by the officers that the sum of \$1.17 be deducted each pay day and placed to the uniform and, this to continue the year through.

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ELECTROCUTION DAY AT CITY JAIL

Two Dozen Dogs of All Breeds and Sizes Were Put to Death There Yesterday.

Yesterday was electrocution day at the city jail and for an hour the deadly work proceeded, resulting in the death by this means of about twenty-four dogs. When the last of the canines had met death there was a pile of dogs in the jail yard sufficient to fill up a wagon.

Marshal Schad was chief executioner, and he had as his assistants a number of negro prisoners. A wire was recently run into the rear of the yard, near where the dogs are kept in pound, and attached to a post. A cut off switch was also placed near, while on the ground directly underneath the uncovered wire is a large piece of zinc.

The half-starved dogs would be led out one at a time. The current was then shut off, while one of the men would take the wire and fasten it around the neck of the animal and through its mouth. A liberal supply of water would then be poured on the animal and zinc and the current turned on.

Several thousand volts of electricity would pass through the body of the dog. The body would quiver and a smell of burning flesh and hair arise. In a second it would fall lifeless to the ground.

The dogs killed yesterday are the ones which have been in pound the time required by law, and for which the owners had not called or else were not willing to pay the required sum.

No sooner had the pound become empty before the dog catchers began to arrive with wagon loads of others, and it is expected that another electrocution will occur within a few days.
