NO PROVISION FOR DEAF AND DUMB SCHOOL

Only Hope for Improvements Now Centered in State Board of Control.

OVER ONE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS NEEDED FOR CONTEMPLATED IMPROVEMENTS BUT AMOUNT CANNOT BE SECURED AT PRESENT.

Now that the Ancient City is assured that the state school for the Deaf and Blind will remain here, people are speculating upon what improvements are provided for, says the St. Augustine Record.

It was believed that the legislature would have made a liberal and much needed appropriation for the school, but the Buckman bill upset all arrangements in that quarter and nothing aside from the actual operating expenses is provided for. The senate passed Senator Zim's bill appropriating \$75,000 for the extension and improvement of the buildings but the bill went no further and the house was not called upon to act upon it. When the Buckman bill passed it was supposed that it would cover the requirements of the Deaf and Blind school as the removal of the institution was contemplated. As the matter now stands the Board of Control has \$150,000 at their disposal and whatever improvements are made must come out of that amount. Recognizing that the afflicted pupils should be considered above normal scholars, the board may see fit to provide liberally for their necessities. Safe means of heating and lighting the buildings is most urgent to protect the unfortunate children from the danger of fire. It would be a very difficult matter to remove all of the pupils were fire to break out in the dead of night. The blind would be at a great disadvantage in finding their way to a place of safety and the deaf would be difficult to awaken from slumber owing to their affliction. Oil lamps which are in use are especially dangerous where blind children are groping around. These are among the most important improvements needed.

No doubt the next legislature will appropriate a sum sufficient to render this institution comfortable and safe. The state press raised its voice in behalf of the school during the last session of the legislature, but unfortunately the unlooked for change in the situation resulted in shelving the appeal.

The appropriation of \$101,000 asked for is needed, but temporary improvements can be made for a small portion of that amount which will render the conditions much pleasanter for the pupils, and the hope is held out that the Board of Control will give the matter due consideration. The buildings alone that were proposed were to cost \$73,000.

The plans called for three new buildings, to be connected and combined. A heating plant to cost \$6,000. The same amount was provided for an electric light plant and \$2,000 was provided for sewerage and water. For fencing and outhouses \$1,500.

Further necessities specified were: Furniture, \$4,000; gymnasium, \$1,500; music department, three pianos, \$750; four organs \$150, band outfit \$100 pipe organ \$1,000—\$2,000; industrial and manual training, printing \$1,000, piano tuning \$1,000, shoe shop \$200 wood-work and carpentry \$1,000, mattress factory \$300, broom making \$500, domestic science for girls \$1,500, total \$5,500; grand total \$101,000.
