### NEW SCHOONER TOWED OVER

ONE LAUNCHED RECENTLY AT MARINE RAILWAY IS NOW ALONGSIDE PALAFOX WHARF.

The new schooner, which was launched last week at the marine railway, was towed over to the city yesterday and is now lying alongside of Palafox wharf. The vessel was built by Saunders & Co. and will be added to the fishing fleet of that firm as soon as she is ready for sea. She was constructed under the supervision of Captain Brown.

The new vessel is a handsome one, and was much admired yesterday by parties who visited the wharf. She is neat and trim, and her model is such that she will be able to make good speed.

The work of fitting in the masts, placing ice boxes and other work will be commenced at once at Palafox wharf. The masts are now in readiness to be placed in position, and it is expected that within the course of a few weeks she will be ready for sea.

The government officials will to-day take the measurement of the new craft which has not yet been named.

## CREW OF CAUCUS WILL LEAVE TO-NIGHT

And it is Expected that the New Dredge Will Reach Here Within Two Weeks.

The crew of the new dredge *Caucus*, built for Pensacola harbor at Sparrows' Point, will leave this city to-night for New York, where they will go on board the dredge and take charge of the various positions which they have been secured to fill.

The selection of the crew for the *Caucus* was made by Captain J. E. Turtle, the United States assistant engineer, and in picking the men he secured the best ones available. It was the desire to get home men to man the *Caucus*, as the department believed that they would not only give better satisfaction, but also would be better satisfied than if men were brought here from New York.

It is expected that the *Caucus* will reach Pensacola within the course of the next two weeks, as she is now almost ready to proceed on her voyage around to Pensacola.

It is presumed that she will begin dredging as soon as she reaches this port.

### The Only One of Its Kind.

## THE AVERY LAW IN A TEST CASE

Jacksonville Negro Who Violated Its Provisions Held to the Criminal Court.

The Jacksonville Metropolis says: Andrew Patterson (colored) was arrested on a car of the North Jacksonville line yesterday afternoon on charge of violating the Avery law by sitting in a seat of said car reserved for the exclusive use of white people. The arrest was instigated by Wetmore & Purcell, the well-known colored attorneys to make a test case.

Patterson was arraigned this forenoon for a preliminary hearing before Justice Willard and the only witnesses heard were Constable Lightbody who made the arrest, and the colored conductor, who endeavored to eject Patterson from the seat he was occupying. The defendant was held in \$100 bail for trial to the criminal court.

A writ of habeas corpus was sued out by the defendant's attorneys and will be presented to Judge Call this afternoon. The writ states that the petitioner further shows that the law creating the supposed offense for which he is arrested is unconstitutional, null and void, for the reason that the said law, known as the "Avery street car law," seeks to divide or separate the white and colored passengers while riding on street cars.

Said law is unconstitutional because:

First—Section two (2) of said street car act is vague and uncertain.

Second—Said act is in violation of the fourteenth amendment of the constitution of the United States of America, in that it denies to a certain class of colored citizens an equal protection of the law.

Third—Because section seven (7) of the act not only gives to certain portion of colored people, to-wit, colored nurses having the care of white children and colored servants in charge of sick white people, rights and immunities denied to other colored people, contrary to the fourteenth amendment of the constitution of the United States of America, but also renders said law special, and not general, contrary to section twenty (20), article three (3), of the constitution of the state of Florida.

Fourth—Said law is in violation of section two (2) of the fourteenth amendment of the constitution of the United States of America, which denies any state the right to pass any law abridging the rights and privileges of citizens of the United States.

Fifth—Said law is a denial to petitioner of the process of law as guaranteed by the fourteenth amendment of the constitution of the United States of America.

Sixth—Said law gives to one class of citizens, to-wit, white citizens, certain rights, privileges and immunities not granted thereby to colored citizens.

Seventh—That the law undertakes to create officers not known to the constitution of Florida, and empowers street railway companies to make the appointment of same, and not requiring said officers to take an oath for the faithful performance of duty, as required by law.

Judge Call set the case this afternoon for a hearing on next Monday morning at 9:30 o'clock.
