WORKING FOR A MILITARY COMPANY

Chamber of Commerce Committee
Endeavoring to Arouse Interest in Pensacola.

At a recent meeting of the Chamber of Commerce the necessity to the business interests of a city of Pensacola's size of maintaining one or more military companies was discussed, with the result that a committee of five was appointed to investigate the feasibility of reorganizing one of the local militia companies recently disbanded by the Adjutant General.

The following committee was appointed, viz: Col. R. M. Cary, C. C. Goodman, Capt. R. M. Bushnell, J. Ed. Williams and Secretary W. C. Jones. Several meetings of this committee have been held and the co-operation of Prof. H. Clay Armstrong and Capt. Stephen D. Lee, of the old Chipley Light Infantry organization secured in the work of reorganizing at least one of the companies.

As chairman of the committee, and an officer in the military organization of the state, Col. Cary was requested to secure from the Adjutant General the necessary authority for the proposed reorganization. This Col. Cary received on Saturday. This permit, however, is good for only thirty days, and it will be necessary that immediate action be taken in the matter, therefore, the Chamber of Commerce is preparing to call a meeting early next week of young men in the city who are interested in military affairs for the purpose of discussing the details of organization.

BOAT CLUB WILL HOLD REGATTA

Arrangements are nearly completed for a regatta to be held on Bayou Chico, between crews representing the Pensacola Rowing Club and the St. John's Boat Club of New Orleans. The event will probably be pulled off on the latter part of September and will no doubt draw a large crowd. The local club is figuring on erecting a large grand stand on the point below the house, where the finishing line will be. The following races will be arranged: Wherry, single shell, double shell and four oared shell.
