## FORMER SOLDIER COMMITS CRIME

James L. McCandless Who Was Attached to Company H, at Fort Barrancas, Masqueraded Under Many Aliases, After Desertion.

James L. McCandless, who served for about a year in battery H, at Fort Barrancas, under the name of E. J. Martinez, is now under arrest in Brooklyn on the charge of causing the death of two women, both of whom he had married under different names. Martinez enlisted in Jersey City, and was sent here with company H, when that command was ordered to Barrancas for duty. His career is one seldom heard of. He went under many aliases, married several times under different names, and finally wound up by murdering two of the women to whom he had been married. A New York paper in giving the history of the former artilleryman, says:

"The man's real name is James L. McCandless. He is reported to have been arrested under the aliases of J. E. McCandless, army thief and deserter; C. R. Farley, check raiser; Edward J. Martinez, blacksmith, black-midler, newspaper faker; and thief; W. Edward de Rodequez, polygamist and wife deserter; William Barr, impostor; Edward Jose de Martinez, bogus Duke of Granada, Spain; Jas. E. Carver, self-accused accomplice in the mythical plot to kill Governor Goebel; J. E. Carver, alleged wife murderer and thief. He has just again been identified under the alias of Edward Martinez.

Dr. Chas. A. Goldsmith, a reputable traveling physician, picked him out of a dozen men at the Raymond street jail as a man who had drugged and robbed him.

Early in July, 1900, while still going under the alias of Martinez, he came to New York. He met Dr. Goldsmith, who was an enthusiastic amateur photographer. They made several trips around New York taking pictures. Dr. Goldsmith took one picture of Martinez. They returned to Goldsmith's room, where Martinez made some tea which rendered Goldsmith unconscious. When he came to his senses, Martinez had disappeared, carrying with him about \$750 in money, a three-carat diamond stud, a diamond and sapphire ring, a diamond-studded Masonic emblem and Dr. Goldsmith's watch.

In April, 1890, he deserted from Ft. Riley, Kan., carrying with him a large amount of government goods, stolen property. He was arrested March 23, 1901, at Columbus Barracks, O., and was tried by court-martial. He pleaded guilty to desertion and theft, and was sentenced to two years' imprisonment in the government prison at Ft. Leavenworth, together with a dishonorable dismissal from the army and forfeiture of all pay.

"He was released on January, 1893, and returned to St. Louis, where his first love entanglement occurred, though after that they came with alarming frequency. He fell in love with a well-to-do St. Louis girl, and procured a dummy minister and fake marriage license and married her, securing all her money. Then she learned of his perfidy and left him.

"Under the name of C. R. Farley he secured employment as a waiter in St. Louis, but was discharged for raising checks on his employer and securing the funds. He then went to New York. In 1894 he contracted his second marriage, this time with Wilmetta Sherwood Bird, who was a well-to-do girl. He took her to Cornwall-on-Hudson, where he forced her to secure employment in the sanitarium of Dr. Rose. While she was working there McCandless forged the name of Dr. John Donehue, to a fake letter of identification. He secured the money and left town to escape arrest.

"He disappeared from public view until November 4, 1896, when he enlisted as a private in Battery H, First artillery, from Jersey City under the name of E. J. Martinez. He was assigned to duty at Ft. Barrancas, Pensacola, Fla., and deserted his second wife to go there.

"While at Pensacola he learned that there was a wealthy widow in Gordon, Ala., who was seeking another husband. He deserted the army a second time on October 17, 1897, and went to Gordon, where he had been in correspondence. They were married next day. He spent her money freely.

"While still living with her, he came north on a visit. He went directly to Rochester, N. Y., where he met Mrs. Lulu Ritz Kittinger of Rochester, whom he had been corresponding through a matrimonial agency. On December 22, 1897, he married her under the name of E. Edw. de Rodequez. He carried her to New York City and lived with her two weeks. Then he became ill, and after getting all her money, McCandless sent her home, telling her he would follow within a few days. He returned to the Gordon, (Ala.) wife, who knew nothing of his other marriage escapades in the interim.

"He spent the next two years around Gordon, Ala., unearthing skeletons in the family closets and threatening to make them public to the world if he was not given "hush" money. This blackmail went on for two years. Then McCandless worked a fake which netted him money and which gave him his ideas on the fake about the murder of Governor Goebel in Kentucky, which he tried to sell to Cincinnati and other papers.

"He came to New York and sold to the Herald a story in which he told of a plot on the part of the Spanish government, to destroy the American battleship Maine. It was a great story, and a still greater fake, for McCand-

less had never been to Cuba. "Made holder by his take, McCandless seized upon the Goebel murder. He went to Cincinnati and agreed to secure a confession from the murderer, of Governor Goebel, whom he swore was John M. Davidson, a Kentuckian, who had killed himself under mysterious circumstances. McCandless said Davis wrote the confession before his death. His fake was revealed and he was arrested for deserting the army.

"When released McCandless went to Washington and New York, where under the name of Carlton, he married the two women he now stands accused of murdering."

## RAPID WORK IN CLEANING UP CITY

Sanitary and Street Forces Have Been More Than Doubled, and the First Day Brought Very Satisfactory Results to Heads of Departments.

RESIDENTS HAVE AIDED MUCH BY COMMENCING TO CLEAN UP THEIR PREMISES—NO NEED FOR UNEASINESS BY THE RESIDENTS, AS STRICT QUARANTINE IS BEING MAINTAINED.

The task of cleaning up Pensacola and placing the city in the best possible sanitary condition was commenced yesterday morning. Extra employees in the various departments went on duty, and with the co-operation of the citizens a large amount of good had been completed by nightfall.

The health authorities wish it thoroughly understood that the present movement to clean up the city is only a precautionary measure. There is no danger of fever reaching here with the present strict quarantine which is being maintained against New Orleans, but it was deemed advisable to clean the city and rid it of all places which might draw mosquitoes or germ-carrying insects.

Superintendent Gingles has placed about forty men at work cutting down weeds, cleaning out drains and placing the streets and squares in good condition. The day was a busy one with this department, and at every point where stagnant water was found a drain was made in order that it might be carried off.

**Extra Inspectors.** Acting City Health Officer Pierpont placed ten additional inspectors on duty with instructions to rush the work as fast as possible, but to see that all yards and lots were cleaned thoroughly. Those appointed were C. L. Brown, Frank Roach, Thos. Tuttle, J. Christie, Charles Simpson, John Baker, Dixon B. Reed, Jr., John Dunn, Dan Siccare and J. A. Colvin. Each inspector was equipped with a can filled with oil and whenever they reached a pool of stagnant water, a liberal supply of oil was poured into it, which will have the effect of killing and driving away mosquitoes.

The city was divided into sections and each inspector was assigned a certain district. These districts will be covered thoroughly, and it is expected that the entire city will be in the best possible condition within the next ten days.

The manner in which the residents of the city began to clean up their premises was very satisfactory to the city authorities. No sooner had they read the proclamation of a curfew of the city hall in order that the officials can see that it is removed.

The matter was discussed yesterday afternoon and the city officers intend seeing that the contractor gives value received, or else it will be removed by the city at his expense.

**More State Inspectors.** Another state inspector in the person of Louis J. Anderson, was added to the force yesterday. He is to make the run on trains, and see that no passengers enter the city from the infected place.

A report from New Orleans last night was to the effect that six deaths had occurred in New Orleans recently, but that the situation was well in hand with no danger of a spread of the disease to neighboring cities.

The local authorities wish it understood that parties who cut down weeds on their premises can have them removed by the city free of charge by notifying the police station, and also that oil and disinfectant can be procured free of cost by applying at the city hall. Over a hundred pounds of the powder disinfectant have been ordered and will reach here within a few days to be distributed to the residents.

## COLORED PEOPLE WILL FIGHT AVERY LAW

Will Furnish Money to Carry Case to U. S. Supreme Court if Necessary.

The Jacksonville Times-Union says: J. Douglass Wetmore, the colored lawyer who is appearing for Patterson, the colored man who has brought a test case in the courts in the hope of having the Avery law separating the races on the street cars declared unconstitutional, takes exception to the published statement of the county solicitor to the effect that the street car companies are behind the movement.

Attorney Wetmore insists that the street car companies have nothing to do with the case in court. In referring to the matter yesterday the attorney said:

"This case has been instigated by the colored people of Jacksonville, through the colored pastors of Jacksonville, who are furnishing money to fight the case. There has not been a dollar paid into any fund as yet, for there has been no necessity for money. But there will be all the money necessary for the carrying on of the fight just as far as we can take it or win out. The idea that we are in cahoots with the railroad lines in Jacksonville cannot be maintained, when it is known that we are not patronizing the cars. The colored people do not like the law, and the colored people here and in all parts of the state are to assist us in making the fight.

**To United States Supreme Court.** When asked if the case would be taken to the United States court if the colored people did not receive what they wanted in the state courts, the attorney said:

"Yes, we are to make the fight for principle, and we are going to take the case to the highest tribunal in the land. To do so is to require money, but we have plenty of it in sight. We really expect to finish the case before the Supreme Court at Washington.

County Solicitor Bryan is confident that the law will stand. So far as the right of states to legislate laws seeking to separate the races is concerned, there are decisions of the United States Supreme Court and every court in the south to bear out the claim that the Avery law is constitutional.

There is a hard fight to be instituted in Judge Call's court tomorrow morning, when the case of Patterson is to come up on a hearing on the writ of habeas corpus. The arguments will bring out all of the fine points of the law in the case, and it is believed that they will have a wide scope. The decision of Judge Call will be awaited with a great deal of interest, and if he declares that the law will hold, the state supreme court is to be called upon at once to consider the case.

In view of the points of constitutional law which the attorney for Patterson has cited in his efforts to have his client released from custody and to kill the bill, it is evident that he confidently expects to have the state courts turn the case down and convict his client, and then make the fight in the United States Supreme Court. The fight in the United States Supreme Court will be fought with some of the ablest counsel of the country, it being the object of the colored people of the entire state to fight the case out to a finish and to spare neither money nor effort in doing so.

In the meantime County Solicitor Bryan claims that the Jacksonville Electric Company is not living up to the law, and that the signs attached to the back of seats does not answer for a division as prescribed by law. At the next term of the Criminal Court this case will come up and will be fought with every effort by the county solicitor and the attorneys for the street car company.

**To Prosecute Companies.** The Jacksonville Metropolis says: County Solicitor W. J. Bryan is not satisfied with the way the street car companies are carrying out the provisions of the Avery law. The solicitor says that he intends to vigorously prosecute the companies when the Criminal Court meets next month. Speaking in this relation Solicitor Bryan said: "I do not think that the little piece of painted plank stuck by pegs on the backs of the seats of the street cars, with 'white' paint on one side and 'colored' on the other, complies with either the letter or the purpose of the law requiring the separation of the races. They neither separate, divide or screen the cars any more than the backs of the seats do. It looks very much like a subterfuge on the part of the company." When asked about the habeas corpus case before Judge Call on next Monday, the solicitor replied that he entertained no doubt as to the constitution-
