GREAT INCREASE IN BANANA IMPORTS

RAILROADS OUT OF MOBILE UNABLE TO HANDLE THE IMMENSE RUSH OF TRAFFIC.

The Mobile Register of Saturday says:

The two railroads of Mobile which are equipped with facilities for the handling of the import fruit trade, have been snowed under, so to speak, by the enormous increase in the imports of bananas to this port since the announcement of the yellow fever in New Orleans and the transfer to this port shortly following that announcement of the boats of several firms doing business over there.

The manner in which the capacity of the Mobile and Ohio and the Louisville and Nashville have been taxed since the transfer of the extra business to this port can be realized when it is stated that within the past eight days, including yesterday, these two roads have handled an aggregate of 750 cars of bananas, the Mobile and Ohio handling 450 and the Louisville and Nashville 300. This is the business of an average month which they have transacted in eight days, so that the increase in the imports by the transference of the business of the New Orleans firms to this port has been nearly quadrupled.

James S. Taylor foreign freight agent of the Mobile and Ohio railroad, was seen last night, and asked about the acknowledged inability of his road to handle the business. He said that it was a fact which he much regretted, but it was nevertheless a fact.

"The most serious question with us," said Mr. Taylor, "is the labor. While we are not directly responsible for the furnishing of the labor for the unloading of the ships, still if we agree to transport the cargoes of a firm's vessels it indirectly behooves us to see and know that there is going to be sufficient labor at hand to give that vessel proper handling. In addition to this drawback we have not the berthing facilities for the handling of the business that is offering now. It is true that we have foreseen the need of additional facilities and bids are being asked now for the making of improvements at our fruit docks, which, when completed, will double our capacity to take care of the fruit trade. The Mobile and Ohio and the Louisville and Nashville have only docking facilities for the accommodation of four vessels, and when these berths are full another steamer puts in an appearance, it is simply a matter of lying out in the stream and waiting for a berth, but this sort of thing is detrimental to the fruit cargo. This influx of vessels that under normal conditions would have been unloaded at New Orleans has much more than doubled the amount of business the roads have to handle under normal conditions.

"It has been a source of great regret to us that we are compelled to notify S. Oteri & Co., and Vaccaro Bros, that we would not be able longer to handle their business. Our regret on this account is intensified from the fact that while S. Oteri & Co. and Vaccaro Bros. have not been identified with the fruit trade of Mobile, they have been our good friends in New Orleans, and have unloaded at the Northwest wharves, which road gives us the freight at Meridian. When we found that a distinction had to be made we felt that we had to take care of those who have been identified with the trade here, who are established here and who have been instrumental in building up the fruit trade of this port.

"The Louisville and Nashville road is in no better condition to take care of this extra business than we are, and it is a matter of regret to the officials of both roads that they are unable to earn the extra revenue thus offering.

"So great has been the influx of vessels in the fruit trade to this port in the past eight or ten days that even the United Fruit Company, which has been from the beginning done much business through this port, has been compelled to divert one of their vessels to an Atlantic port."

Mr. Taylor said he had held conferences with the responsible heads of the two firms involved in the new order of things, and that he had held out to them no hope that the Mobile and Ohio could help them out of their difficulty. He said that he did not know what steps the firms had taken, though it was possible that one of the firms, having fast boats, would be able to import their cargoes through an Atlantic port.

Florida the Best Place.

Florida is the best place. This is what people say who return home from other places to which they have recently been seeking cool weather and comfort. A lady sojourning in California, who resides in Jacksonville says the climate out there is too cool for summer, and another one in the mountains of North Carolina says she has seen this summer warmer weather and more sultry weather than Florida ever has.

"I never wanted to get home as bad in my life," said a gentleman yesterday on arrival here. He said he had experienced none of the cool, refreshing breeze at night that always prevails in Florida. "I can always sleep in Florida, but I could not in Boston, New York or Philadelphia during the past month." It is the same old story. A person fares as well in Florida the year round as he can anywhere in this country.—Jacksonville Metropolis.

MAKING MIAMI A FINE SEAPORT

EIGHTEEN FEET OF WATER WILL BE OBTAINED BY FIRST OF JANUARY.

For more than a year two dredges and one rock-cutting machine have been steadily at work cutting their way from the terminal wharf to deep water in the ocean at Miami, Fla. From the day the work began there has been little delay, either night or day, says the Jacksonville Metropolis.

The Florida East Coast Railway dredge has commenced its third trip across the bay, cutting a channel sixteen feet deep, or down to the rock, and one hundred and twenty feet wide. As soon as it reaches the point where the government took up the work, it will go over the channel, cutting out the rock to a depth of eighteen feet. The Ross Company with their large dredge, have cut through the peninsula to a depth of sixteen to eighteen feet, and now are on the eastern ridge moving eastward in taking out the sand the Ross Company used suction dredges; but the broken rock which has been rushed and broken by the great chisel machine is being taken out with a powerful dipper dredge. This dredge is now making its way into the ocean, the work through the peninsula being nearly completed.

It is believed that by the 1st of January Miami will have eighteen feet of water from the terminal dock to the ocean. Already several of the large ocean-going yachts, the finest in the United States, are booked for Miami next winter. These floating palaces belong to the millionaires of the north, east and west. It is also believed that early in the year additional lines of steamers will be put on between Miami and northern ports, and also between Miami and the Far East.

Miami, with eighteen feet of water, with the finest and most substantial automobile roads in the state, and a back country teeming with life and activity, and its incomparable climate, is an assurance that the prosperity already attained is but the beginning and that the development of the rural districts and the city has but just commenced.

SHORT LIVED QUARANTINE

INSTITUTED AGAINST TAMPA BY THE FORTS—CALLED OFF WHEN SUPPLIES RAN SHORT.

The Tampa Times publishes the following report of an opera bouffe quarantine declared against the city:

There was a quarantine on against Tampa for a couple of days last week at a point not over forty miles from the city, and yet no one knew of it in this city.

The gallant defenders of the port of Tampa received notice through some unknown source, that there were three cases of fever at Tampa. The military authorities acted with their usual precision and declared a quarantine on both Egmont and Mullet keys against the city.

Certain residents of Tampa, who were visiting on the islands at the time, decided to hike homeward, but they found that there was "nothing doing." The officers of the forts had sternly forbidden the government boat—then in this port—to return to the pleasant isles set against the western sun at the mouth of Tampa bay.

So the visitors hiked over the rolling sea And came to Tampa through the Manatee.

Then certain things became of serious bent on the isles against, etc. The transport not being permitted to ply back and forth, the supplies of edibles commenced to grow slim, starvation stared the gallant defenders in the face, but they declined to give up the siege.

And then—worst thing a man could have feared—The officers' grog had all disappeared.

Naturally under these circumstances, even the most gallant grew gloomy, and there was talk of raising the siege in order that the necessities of life might be obtained.

About this time, a supply of "wire netting" was delivered in Tampa. The tug James H. Clarke had the contract for carrying this "netting" to the keys, and the gallant captain was in a quandary as to what he should do.

So he chased away to the state health agent.

Got a bill of health without cost of a cent.

Following which he stored the "netting" below decks and sailed away for the forts. There he found armed guards pacing the beach, but when the glad news was disseminated that there was no fever in Tampa, the captain received an ovation and was the hero of the hour.
