BASIS FIXED AT 100 PER CENT

On the Taxable Property of the City, Which Now Reaches a Valuation of \$11,000,000—Board Now Hearing Protests and Meetings Held Each Day.

HERETOFORE PROPERTY HAS BEEN ASSESSED ON BASIS OF 70 PER CENT. OF ACTUAL VALUE—PROBABLE THAT DECREASE WILL BE MADE IN TAX RATE.

The City Board of Equalization, which since the formation of that body has been considering having property of the city assessed upon a basis of 100 per cent., has at last decided to make that change. Heretofore all property was assessed upon a basis of 70 per cent. of its actual value. The increase in the assessment value, however, does not necessarily mean that the same rate of taxation will apply, but in all probability it will be decreased to 7 or 8 mills, while it now stands at 11 mills.

SLAUGHTER DAY AT THE DOG POUND

Over Forty Canines Were Electrocutted There Yesterday Afternoon.

Yesterday was slaughter or electrocution day at the city dog pound, and over forty canines of all sizes, sexes, and breeds were given an electrical snook which put them forever to sleep. Marshal Schad again acted in the capacity of chief electrocutioner, and as fast as the dogs could be taken from the pound and the electric wire placed about their necks, he turned on the current. Death was almost instantaneous in each instance. When the marshal and his force began their work the pound was filled with yelping curs of all descriptions, which had made night hideous in that section of the city for several nights. Every dog in the pound was electrocuted with one exception and that one was held as the necessary number of days have not elapsed. The books of Assessor Rellly showed a healthy increase in the growth of Pensacola. Placing the valuation on the basis of 100 per cent. it is shown that the increase in property values within one year has amounted to \$700,000, making a total valuation on a basis of 100 per cent. of about \$11,000,000. The present tax rate of the city is 11 mills, but with the assessment of property at the full valuation it is probable that this will be cut down to 7 or 8 mills. While there will be neither an increase or decrease in the amount of money received from taxes the assessing of property at its full valuation will have a tendency to impress the stranger with the wealth of the city and the low rate of taxation. COUNTY SCHOOL BOARD HELD MEETING

A Number of New Teachers Were Assigned to Schools and Big Debt Paid.

The regular monthly meeting of the County Board of Public Instruction was held yesterday, all members being present. There was no special business, although a number of teachers were assigned to schools. The report of the treasurer showed that there was a balance on hand to the credit of the school fund amounting to \$3,597.54. The pay roll, amounting to \$3,683.50 was approved and ordered paid. The resignation of J. Ormond as supervisor of school No. 4 was accepted, and Jas. A. McKinnon elected in his stead. J. E. Spoon was selected as supervisor of school No. 26, taking the place of J. M. Heighon, who declined to serve.

The president and superintendent were authorized to make a number of necessary improvements to the grounds to be occupied by the new school building on West Hill. This school is to be known as No. 80. As the treasurer's report showed a balance on hand of over \$3,000 it was ordered that the note of the board for the sum of \$3,000, made some months since, be liquidated. Teachers were appointed as follows: School No. 9—Mrs. Carrie L. Seal and Miss Harriet Pritchett, assistants. School No. 15—Miss Pearl Crabtree. School No. 18—A. C. Myers. School No. 21—Miss Pearl Stricklett. School No. 22—Miss Ida Barns. School No. 79—Miss Ethel M. Hayes and Mrs. Gilton Nichols, assistants.

DR. PORTER TO THE TRAVELING PUBLIC

Issues Statement Relative to Necessity for Health Certificates in Florida.

The inspectors who are representing the State Board of Health to keep refugees from entering the state are working zealously, says the Jacksonville Times-Union, and several parties have been turned back within the last twenty-four hours.

Despite the fact that the press all over the country has announced that it will require evidence of not having been in an infected district in the past ten days to enter this state, people will insist on making an effort to get through. Yesterday a lady and child were put off the train at Camp Perry, from a Southern train. The lady could not give the evidence asked for, and while the inspector regretted the circumstances, she and her child were put off. The passengers who are detained are well cared for at the camp and some of them soon get the wires busy and have evidence sufficient to permit them to come on the next train. In order to facilitate matters, Dr. Porter has issued the following statement as to certificates:

Suggestions From Dr. Porter. "Suggestions of state health authorities for the benefit of the traveling public: "Medical train inspectors of this state and other states as well, will require certificates of identification and whereabouts of persons for ten previous days before travelers can legally enter Florida until the present rigid quarantine against yellow fever infected points has been raised or modified. It is suggested, therefore, and the newspapers of the state might publish for the benefit of their readers a form of identification and whereabouts certificate as follows: "This is to certify that _____ personally appeared before me at _____ Florida, on the _____ day of _____ 1905, apparently in good health, and affixed hereto the signature for purposes of identification, and has to my knowledge been in this _____ for _____ days. "Signature of _____ "Notary or other officer." (Impression seal.)

Holders of certificates as above can at every stopping point along the line of travel request the local railroad ticket agent or postmasters to stamp their certificates, showing their whereabouts, by dates, and can also easily identify themselves by writing their signatures in the presence of and for comparison with signatures in certificates by the inspectors, wherever and whenever encountered, inside of Florida.
