DR. GUTERAS ON THE FEVER SITUATION

Eminent Physician Does Not Believe It Will Be Stamped Out Until Frost.

Dr. Guteras, the yellow fever specialist passed through Montgomery on Friday en route to Mobile. While in that city he gave out the following interview to the Montgomery Journal:

"I do not believe that the yellow fever in New Orleans will be stamped out until after frost."

This was the statement made to a Journal reporter by Dr. John Guteras, the yellow fever expert, formerly connected with the United States Marine Hospital service but now stationed at Havana, Cuba, when he was in the city this morning.

Dr. Guteras is recognized the world over as a yellow fever expert and during the yellow fever at New Orleans the last time he did much toward stamping out the disease. He came here from Tampa, Fla., and left for Mobile where he intends to stay several days and then goes to New Orleans.

While in Tampa he was accompanied by Dr. Porter, the Florida health officer and they investigated the situation there.

"There is no yellow fever at Tampa," said Dr. Guteras. "Dr. Porter and myself made a thorough examination." He stated that there was fever there but not yellow fever.

Praises Doctors.

The expert made a visit to Minnhnet, the yellow fever patient at the emergency hospital and also visited the Capitoila Hotel where he was taken sick. He is high in his praise of the doctors here and says they did the proper thing by taking him to the emergency hospital and having him screened and the work at the hotel was also praised. He does not believe there will be any spread of the disease here.

"Tampa took the same precautions as Montgomery," said Dr. Guteras, "and there was no spread of the disease there."

He is a strong believer in having the patients screened.

Talks About New Orleans.

"If New Orleans had done as Montgomery and Tampa in screening the first patients," said the expert, "there would not have been so much yellow fever there now." He was glad to see the government take charge of the work and said the government should have taken charge when the first case was reported. He did not believe that the fever would be stamped out before frost, but he did say that the government authorities are getting it under control and also that would practically be impossible to stamp it out until after frost.

"The doctors should have reported the first suspicious case," said Dr. Guteras, "and then the patient should have been sent to a hospital and screened." He advocated reporting suspicious cases.

Educate the People.

"The people have got to be educated on the yellow fever question," said the doctor, "so they can understand when a man has yellow fever, and the physicians immediately have him screened and proper precautions taken." He said there was no necessity for the panicky feeling when the physicians know how to handle the situation. He said that the people should have been educating themselves along the line since 1901 and then they would have been better prepared to understand the situation.

Mosquito Theory.

The doctor is a great believer in the mosquito theory. He believes this is the only way of infection. He stated that a mosquito could live five months in fact all the summer. This will settle the question as to the length of the life of a mosquito. There were a good many contentions along this line. The doctor said a mosquito could live this long but did not state that this was the average life.

Government Control.

"I believe that the government should have control of the yellow fever situation," declared Doctor Guteras. He said the government was better able to handle the fever than the local authorities and that the government should have a fund to pay the expenses. He also believed that the government should charge for the quarantine, in fact he believes that the government should enact such laws as are necessary to have control over the whole affair.

Talks About Havana.

"In Havana," said the doctor, "the people there are educated upon the question of yellow fever. There is no yellow fever there now. Why even take yellow fever patients from Mexico, bring them to Havana, take them through the streets in an ambulance and to the hospital. They are screened and sometimes the nurses that wait on them are not immune. The people there knew how to treat the disease."

While here the doctor was at the state health office for some time and then with the physicians who took him out to see Minnhnet.

DECREASING THE INSPECTION FORCE

Four Inspectors Were Taken From the Force During Yesterday By City Health Officer.

Owing to the fact that work of inspecting the city has progressed to such a degree that it is no longer necessary to have a large force of inspectors, Acting-City Health Officer Pierpont yesterday reduced the force of men, who have been employed during the past few weeks.

When the fever was first discovered in New Orleans the board of health of the city took prompt measures to see that Pensacola was placed in a sanitary condition, but in order to accomplish this it was necessary to put on a large force of inspectors. The number was increased from four to fourteen, and since that time a most thorough canvass of the city has been made.

Yesterday, however, it was found that ten men could do the work, as the city was in good condition, and as a consequence Dr. Pierpont released four from further service.

It is anticipated that if the work proceeds as it has for the past two weeks, that next week will witness another reduction in the force.
