ENVOYS ARE PLAYING

How far it will be threshed out before it is "passed over" is problematic. Fishar rights Russia will yield. There only remains limitation upon Russia's sea power and the surrender of the interned warships.

The final struggle is close at hand and preparations are being made for it. When the remaining points of possible agreement are demonstrated an adjournment will be taken, probably until Monday, when the plenipotentiaries will show their last cards.

Japanese Cables Extensive.
The Japanese are in the closest touch with their government. They are keeping Tokyo advised of every development of the proceedings. It was 6 o'clock this morning when last night's stream of cables to Japan was completed.

The weather since the arrival of the plenipotentiaries has strangely followed the prevailing sentiment as to the outcome.

To-day was bright and cherry. The sun shone gloriously. It was another page out of the wonderful weather book to which New England has treated her distinguished foreign guests. Last week the heat was unbearable and the plenipotentiaries were testy and angry. Saturday was cold and dreary, and it looked as if a storm would break. But it did not and the fear that negotiations would be broken off when the meeting occurred in the afternoon after the presentation of the Russian reply was happily averted. Sunday was fair and bright, Tuesday it stormed and in the conference room the first insurmountable barrier appeared—the cessation of Sakhalin. Yesterday forenoon the weather cleared and the plenipotentiaries while returning to the hotel were treated to the sight of a glorious New England sunset.

Envoys in Good Humor.
The peace plenipotentiaries who have alternately sweated and been chilled, shivered and been soaked, seemed in fine spirits when they started away from the hotel to-day.

Most of the Japanese missions were so busy in preparing cables last night that they were, in consequence, a little behind the regular hour in getting downstairs this morning. It was close to 9:30 o'clock before Mr. Takahira, followed by Baron Komura and Mr. Sato, came down to the veranda and received the usual respectful greeting from the guests who invariably gather to see them off.

The Russian envoys were half way to the navy yard when the Japanese set out.

TRYING TO PROVE WILLIAMS INSANE

in the court room are satisfactory and as far as could be ascertained, there have been no complaints regarding the board.

Smile Has Vanished.
The prisoner was brought into the court room about fifteen minutes before the court convened and until he took his usual seat near his attorneys, put in the time greeting relatives and friends. The smile, which has heretofore been almost constant, was missing and he appeared to be considerably worried and somewhat nervous.

He carried a small fan in his hand as he was driven to the court house by Sheriff Van Belt and, throughout the morning toyed with it almost incessantly. He appeared to be more interested in the proceedings than on previous occasions and watched each witness as the testimony was adduced. He frequently conferred with his attorneys relative to his case. His uneasiness was more noticeable as the case proceeded, during the morning hours.

THE DEFENSE PLACES MRS. WILLIAMS ON THE STAND.

The wife of defendant, Mrs. William F. Williams, was the first witness at the morning session and testified wholly with reference to the peculiar actions of defendant within a few weeks previous to the killing of John White. When she took a seat upon the witness stand she appeared slightly nervous, but answered the questions propounded by the attorneys in a straightforward and concise manner.

Peculiar Actions.
Mrs. Williams testified that, for several months prior to the killing of Mr. White she had noticed her husband acting strangely at times, but was only able to recollect two specific instances. On one occasion her husband had come home and, after seating himself at the supper table for a minute, arose without eating and went to the front of the house. She followed and saw him in a stooping posture, like one searching for something, moving slowly around near the edge of the veranda. Afterwards Williams had gone to the house and procured a package and left the house. He had only remained away about ten minutes and when he returned still carried the package. When witness spoke to him he appeared preoccupied and said she was worrying over nothing. Defendant had left the house again the same evening, returning after a short time. He also carried the package on this occasion but when he returned had placed it upon a table in the bedroom. Witness had not opened the package that night but the next morning, upon investigation found it to contain an old pair of overalls and a cap. This was about three weeks before the killing.

"I Can't Stand It"
Mrs. Williams said that defendant was restless at night, often starting up from apparently sound slumber and cried and took on and said he "couldn't stand it." Witness could not remember what he begged witness to come and stay near him. Witness said: "He would wake me up in the night and say, 'I can't stand it; I don't know what to do.' This occurred about two weeks before the double tragedy in John White's store.

Attorney Maxwell stated that there were three or four witnesses whose evidence was material, who would be summoned immediately by telephone, and a recess of ten minutes was ordered by the court in order to allow them to be procured.

Henry White.
Henry White was the first witness called by defense after recess. He had known defendant for several months; both had been working at John White's store. He had known or defendant buying and selling overalls; witness had had them from time to time. He knew defendant had two guns and that he had sold them. Witness could not say exactly when that was; possibly about four or five months back. Defendant had purchased a revolver from Lischkoff and had sold it to E. L. Reese. This was the second revolver defendant had sold, the first one having been disposed of to a turpentine man. Witness had seen revolvers in possession of defendant at many different times and knew that it was his custom to traffic more or less in weapons of this nature.

The evidence of Mr. White was adduced for the purpose of showing that it was usual for the defendant to have revolvers in his possession and that the revolver purchased from Mr. Bruce was in line with traffic of this character.

Witness did not know anything about the revolver purchased from F. B. Bruce and was not in the city at the time John White was killed. He knew of Dancy and Constable Bobe going to Century and said it was upon Friday; the following Sunday witness had left for Hot Springs.

Alex Lischkoff.
Alex Lischkoff, a pawn broker, testified that to the best of his knowledge he had sold defendant a revolver several months previous to the killing; it was a Smith & Wesson revolver and the price paid was \$10. He had an indistinct recollection of trading with defendant for a revolver, but could not recollect any of the details of the transaction.
