## HILLSBORO HAS THE "LAST SURVIVOR"

When the surviving members of the Eighth Illinois cavalry meets in Chicago September 8, says the Army and Navy Register, they will have an opportunity to talk over the stirring events of '65 with their former antagonist, Captain E. A. Worrell, of this city, president of the association, age extended, through John H. Alexander, a lawyer, who was a member of Mosby guerrillas, an invitation to

the survivors of the southern command to join the Illinois regiment in the celebration. Colonel John S. Mosby has signified his intention of being present, as well as a large number of other survivors of the regiment, according to a statement made by Captain Worrell. The guerrillas will reciprocate by inviting the members of the Eighth to attend their annual reunion, the date and place for which have not yet been settled. In forwarding his invitation to the former guerrillas to attend the reunion Captain Worrell enclosed a roster of the survivors of the Eighth cavalry. Mr. Alexander, in accepting the invitation, designates the list as a "roll of honor," and adds: "There were no soldiers in the federal army for whose fighting qualities were entertained so high a regard as those of the Eighth cavalry, except perhaps poor Blazer's West Virginians, who fought us to a finish at Kabetown in October, 1864."

There may be "a" Col. Mosby still alive, and several of his alleged guerrilla "survivors," but there is only one real, genuine, live, survivor of "Mosby's men," and he lives or did live when the writer last saw him, in Hillsborough county. And he is the only one for he used to assure the Tampa newspaper people of that fact ten years ago. The Tampa Times should see that "The only real survivor" gets to that reunion and shames the pretenders.

# PENROSE TO GO ON PATROL DUTY

## Will Assist the Cutter Hamilton in Watching the Coast for Next Few Weeks.

The revenue cutter Penrose, which has been used for many years in the harbor by the customs inspectors to board vessels, has been assigned to patrol duty along the outside beach, and will hereafter assist the cutter Hamilton in this work.

The Hamilton has been in port for a number of days undergoing repairs, but one vessel is not sufficient to patrol the coast between Pensacola and Perdido, so the Penrose was ordered to assist in the work. Another cutter is patrolling from Mobile to Perdido. This is done in order that no vessels from New Orleans, or any other infected port may enter Pensacola. It would be an impossibility for a vessel of large tonnage to slip into port, but it would have been easy for a small boat filled with passengers to come into port before this patrol was established.

Captain Hanks, commanding officer of the Hamilton, is in charge of the patrol work, the cutter Penrose being under his command.

Commanding officers of the Penrose were changed yesterday, Lieut. Geo. C. Carpenter, formerly of the Hamilton, a line officer, taking command, with Lieut. J. F. Bryan, an engineer officer.

The Penrose would have assumed her new duties yesterday, but for the fact that an accident occurred, which will require at least a week for repairs before she is ready to proceed to duty.

# GUNBOAT WASP TO SAIL FOR NEWPORT

## Vessel, Which Has Been Stationed Here for Years, is to Sail To-night.

The gunboat Wasp, which has been stationed at the Pensacola navy yard for a number of years, is to leave late this afternoon or tonight, proceeding from here to points along the coast, and later to Newport News.

The Wasp came here about three years since, being detailed to serve as the vessel on which the commander of the Eighth naval district was to make his inspections. She has been used almost exclusively for this purpose, and has made a number of trips in gulf waters, going from Tampa to the Rio Grande and visiting many ports within the district.

Recently orders were received to place the gunboat in commission, and she then proceeded to Key West, thence to Norfolk. Her final destination is yet unknown.

What vessel will replace the Wasp in the local service has not yet been made public by the department.

## Pretty Design for Separate Waist

The distinctive touch that the French endeavor, and so successfully, to attain in all their small belongings is cleverly displayed in this dainty blouse of white crepe de chine and lace. The collar and shallow yoke are of white Bruges, and to this the blouse is applied in fancy shirring done over featherbone cordings. The fastening is in the back; and the fullness drawn down into the ribbon belt which is passed through a buckle to hold it taut and snug. The sleeve is a dainty design, three puffs topping a deep shaped cuff, rows of shirring similar to those on the waist separating the puffs. The yoke and cuff may be omitted when the blouse is destined for evening wear.
