BLANCHARD AND JELKS IN A WRANGLE

Governors of Louisiana and Alabama May Clash Over Quarantine Regulations.

New Orleans, Aug. 23.—While the fever in New Orleans is submitting to control, the situation in the country districts is less promising and both the state board of health and the Marine Hospital Service now have their hands full in trying to send adequate assistance to those settlements which are struggling with the disease. Scarcely a day passes without the report of some newly infected point and unless doctors and nurses are sent from here there is no assurance that the fever will not spread. The worst news thus far discovered is that at Lineville, near the mouth of Bayou La Fourche, where nearly two-thirds of a settlement of 300 people has been infected and where a number of deaths have occurred. Only one doctor is on the scene and his difficulties are increased by the fact that the settlement lies on two banks of a rather wide stream. President Souther and his forces were to-day engaged in making preparations to send relief to Dr. Devcon while at the same time taking precautions to cut off communication between Lineville and New Orleans. There is some fear that the Italians there will try to return here, thereby adding to the infection which already exists in the foreign quarters. Assistance, however, is being asked by other points in the matter of physicians and nurses. There is a steady increase at Hanson City; in St. Charles parish the infection is scattered and increasing and beyond the control of the force thus far sent there; an inspector is asked for Port Barrow in Ascension; the infected points in St. Mary are asking more help and St. Bernard with its large Italian population is likely to need aid.

Meantime hopefulness continues to pervade New Orleans. The new cases show no increase, but on the contrary are slightly declining, which is the reverse of the experience in 1878. In that year there were 194 new cases on the 14th, and thereafter with three exceptions to the end of the month the daily reports exceeded 100, reaching 220 on the 28th and 234 on the 31st. Eight new foci appeared above Canal street, the preceding 24 hours, but all were widely scattered and confidence continues that it is impossible for the infection to get a firm grip on that section. Among the new cases down town is one in the Holy Cross college, a prominent Catholic institution. The school is now in vacation and strenuous efforts will be made to destroy the focus there in order not to interfere with its reopening.

Blanchard and Jelks. Governor Blanchard and Governor Jelks threaten to become engaged in controversy over the quarantine regulations of Alabama. The trouble grows out of complaint made by citizens of Louisiana, which was taken up by Governor Blanchard. Governor Jelks announces that people who have left Louisiana and expect to return there would not be permitted to pass through Alabama unless they had spent seven days in detention. In one case a prominent cotton man who had business in Atlanta went there and transacted his business in a day. He started back to New Orleans, but was intercepted in Alabama and sent back to Atlanta on the ground that he must have been seven days out of Louisiana before he could pass through Alabama on his return. Governor Blanchard in a letter to Governor Jelks says he doubts whether any state in the union has a right to interfere with interstate passenger traffic and expresses the hope that the matter will be taken into the federal courts for a test.

Reports continue to reach here that Louisiana towns are beginning to suffer severely through the cutting off of their supplies. At Crowley, for instance, all the merchants have already run out of flour. More flour has been ordered, but traffic on the railroads has been so badly crippled that it is a problem when it will arrive.

The Italian societies here are receiving appeals from their countrymen in the various infected districts in the country for financial assistance and medical supplies. They are doing all in their power, though already greatly burdened by the local demands made upon them.

In spite of the severity of the quarantine the state engineers are making diligent efforts to keep their levee campaign under way. The work has been much interfered with, but Chief Engineer Kerr said to-day that he hoped to be able to carry many of the contracts through before high water.

Ausleys & Co's Daily Cotton Letter. New York, Aug. 23.—Liverpool came in this morning 4 to 5 points lower, which was slightly better than was warranted by our closing prices of yesterday. Our market responded to the better feeling, and opened with an advance of 10 to 12 points over last night's closing, and was very steady during the first hour with continued advance of 4 to 5 points. Later, a slight reaction set in, but was promptly checked by heavy buying, and reports of continued drought in Texas, and prospects of a bullish government report on the 3rd of next month. Prices rose steadily until the close, scoring a net gain from opening figures of about 8 points. Close was steady at the advance. All indications point to ultimately higher prices, with moderate reactions occasionally. Our firm belief is that cotton is a purchase on all reactions.

IS JURY SYSTEM RESPONSIBLE FOR CRIME? Escapes and Pardons Give Encouragement to the Criminally Inclined.

The Jacksonville Metropolis of Tuesday evening says:

Our faulty jury system is, in a large measure, responsible for the increase of crime in this and other states. The verdict in the Williams case, which carried with it a recommendation of mercy, has chagrined the law abiding people of the state. Williams recently, without provocation, deliberately murdered John White, his employer and benefactor. He then turned the weapon on a fellow clerk named Ed Dancy and murdered him, too. After Dancy was shot Williams seriously wounded James White, son of the murdered White.

The Tom Hammond Case. A few years ago Duval county was the scene of one of the most brutal triple murders that was ever committed in the south, yet the murderer secured a recommendation of mercy and escaped from the State prison camp in a few weeks after the sentence. This was the case of Tom Hammond, who, with an axe, murdered his grandmother, his uncle and his aunt. The murdered family had been the benefactors of the boy, but to secure some money the grandmother had in the house, he committed his heinous crime. The evidence was strong against him, and the jury was convinced that he was guilty, yet a recommendation of mercy resulted in his liberation.

A Great Drawback. The jury system is, as it stands, a great drawback. Professional jurors hang around court rooms waiting for an opportunity to get on the jury. Such men should never be chosen, because they serve entirely for the fee. Many of them in their anxiety to serve, do not adhere to the truth while being examined.
