**PEOPLE SUPPORTING HEALTH OFFICERS**

Says Mayor Bliss, and as a Result the Work of Wiping Out the Fever Is Pushed Much More Vigorously and Effectively Than When Work First Started.

Mayor Bliss, who is lending every assistance possible to the health authorities in the fight to eradicate the yellow fever, was seen last night, and gave out the following interview:

"The situation is very encouraging though it is quite likely that several cases may yet develop. Everything possible is being done by the health authorities and the people are now rallying to their support.

"Tomorrow is fumigation day and from appearances it will be generally observed and untold thousands of mosquitoes will certainly perish.

"President Knowles, of the First National Bank, this morning offered to start a list with a subscription of \$500.00 to be used to further prosecute the cleaning up of the city. I hardly know to what extent further sanitary measures were needed. This afternoon I made a tour of the infected district and adjacent territory with Acting Street Superintendent Spottswood and I found some places in such bad condition that I feel justified in accepting the offer of Mr. Knowles, which, I might here add, other gentlemen have signified a willingness to supplement. I was astonished to find how filthy some places were which had been certified to as being 'in good sanitary condition' by the health inspector. We have two gangs of men cleaning up these places and others may be added.

"It is hard to keep a city in good condition in the absence of sewers but there is absolutely no excuse for tons of filth and rubbish to accumulate on premises.

"I shall continue to clean up the city and when it has been put into the best possible condition it will then be a smaller matter to keep it so.

"Urge the people to fumigate tomorrow and kill the mosquito. To kill the mosquitoes is to end the fever, restore us to normal conditions and inspire confidence in the outside world that we are able to cope with the disease and that their money may find safe investment in our city."

**HUSBAND 105 WIFE WAS 90**

Aged Mississippians Die Within a Week of Each Other.

PROGENY INCLUDES 10 CHILDREN, 43 GRANDCHILDREN, 75 GREAT-GRANDCHILDREN — SON BORN WHEN ANDREW JACKSON WAS PRESIDENT.

The correspondent at Press Post-office of the Columbian, published at Columbia, Miss., recently sent that paper the following:  
 "Uncle Willis Raiborn and Aunt Sallie Raiborn, the oldest married couple in south Mississippi, are dead at their home, near here. Only nine days separated the demise of the couple, who were remarkable in a great many respects. The husband succumbed to old age on Sunday, August 12, 1905, and his wife followed him to the grave on August 21, 1905. Willis Raiborn was past the century mark. Some say that he was 105 years old. His helpmeet was over 90 years old.

"The oldest son, Isaac Raiborn, of Trim, Miss., was born during Andrew Jackson's administration. 'Uncle Willis' has a vivid recollection of the war of 1812, and furnished his neighbors with accounts of personal deeds of valor during that conflict.

"The couple is survived by progeny numbering 137. There are ten children, forty-two grandchildren and seventy-five great-grandchildren.

"The two graves are side by side in the cemetery near the little church where the old couple worshipped up to within a short time of their deaths."

**BAPTISTS MUST NOT RENT TO SALOON MEN**

Atlanta, Sept. 7.—Baptists living in Atlanta and surrounding towns who own property in which saloons are run will either have to sell their property or make the barkeepers move out, or quit the church according to the decision of the Stone Mountain Baptist association which met at Lithonia yesterday.

The resolution provides that should any church in the association refuse to expel members disobeying this command the churches shall be turned out of the association. It is thought that several churches may object to carrying out the resolution and sensational results are expected.

**Visited the Guards.**  
 Dr. Porter, in company with Sheriff Van Pelt, made the rounds of the cordon which has been placed about the city, yesterday afternoon, and the state health officer was much pleased with the manner in which it is being maintained. He complimented the sheriff upon the businesslike way he had gone about his duties, and the thoroughness of the quarantine. He said:

"I visited the guard lines with Sheriff Van Pelt this afternoon and want to say that your sheriff is a very efficient officer. He showed much activity in getting men to place on guard duty, and although notified only Sunday night he had the city cordoned by Monday morning. There are about fifty men on duty as guards and four captains and the service is very efficient. The men seem to understand their duties thoroughly and state that they have had but little trouble. The country people, as a rule, commend the health officials for placing a cordon around the city.

"I feel greatly indebted to Sheriff Van Pelt," continued the state health officer, "for the prompt and efficient manner in which he acted. He seems to be a man of a great deal of firmness, but is quiet, uses discretion and brooks no foolishness. He is a good officer."

**Cleaning Up progressing.**  
 The work of fumigating, screening and giving the city a general cleaning up is progressing nicely. At every residence where a case of yellow fever develops, all houses within a radius of three hundred feet are thoroughly fumigated. This was done yesterday at the home of Herman Pinyon, who was taken ill the day previous.

**Schad Hard at Work.**  
 Marshal Schad is doing valiant service in assisting the health authorities. He is out each day looking after the work being done by the city and investigating places which should be cleaned. This work, added to his usual duties, keeps the marshal a busy man all day and until late in the night, but he sees that everything is completed before going to his home.

Felix Glackmeyer is another hard worker. He is in charge of the fumigation of cars loaded and unloaded in the district. Every shipment of freight that leaves the city must be thoroughly fumigated before it leaves here and Mr. Glackmeyer has supervision over all of this work, making daily reports to the state health officer. The work so far done has been very satisfactory to Dr. Porter.

**CATCHING A LOON.**  
 The Way a Hunter Got One and Why He Let It Go.

Once, and only once, I caught a young northern diver, says Graham West in Recreation. It was in July in the Laurentians in a little lake far back in the forest covered hills—loons always nest on small islands in lakes, never where foxes can get at the eggs or young. The birds at first are coal black. The one I took was the size of a pigeon and it took me twenty minutes to get it. When pursued the little fellows make for the open deep water, never skulk among the weeds, and rely entirely upon their wonderful diving powers. You can only catch them when they are very young and on a perfectly calm day when you can see them the instant they come up.

I followed the bird so quickly that I was always near when it rose and by shouting and brandishing the paddle frightened it into diving before it had regained its wind. At length it could now dive more than a foot or two below the surface and then I caught it in my hand. It was savage and sea-sick in the canoe. The mother kept near it from first to last, swam round the canoe, calling most plaintively the while, the note being "Whe-on-on," quite distinct from the usual mocking laugh, "Ha-ha-ha-ha! Ha-ha-ha-ha!" I paddled the little loon about a mile and then put it overboard very gently, and the mother led it off in triumph.
