BIRMINGHAM TO HAVE WOMAN'S HOTEL

Place Will Open About October 1 and Will Fill Long Felt Want.

The Birmingham Age-Herald says: The Woman's Hotel, which will be run by the Young Women's Christian association, will be opened about the first of October. The final arrangements for the opening of the hotel will be made at a meeting of the Young Women's Christian association to be held Tuesday morning.

The old Frank Y. Anderson residence on Twenty-first street between Seventh and Eighth avenues will be used for the hotel and it is being fitted out by public subscription of money, furniture, bedding and other necessities.

The object of the hotel is to furnish young working women a place where they can enjoy all the comforts of home at a very small expense, and at the same time a place where they can be thrown under Christian influences.

The hotel will have about 14 or 15 bed rooms, a dining room where all meals will be served, a kitchen, sitting room and parlors. The rooms will be fitted out nicely, and the young women living in the hotel will have every modern convenience.

Mrs. Merrivether of Mobile arrived in the city yesterday. She will have charge of the arrangements for opening the hotel and have charge of it when opened. She will meet with the directors of the Young Women's Christian association Tuesday.

One of the members of the board of the Young Women's Christian association said yesterday: "This home will fill a long felt need in Birmingham. We have been endeavoring for two years to get such an institution and now it looks as if our efforts are to be rewarded."

"We expect the hotel to be practically self-sustaining, as the expenses will be reduced to a minimum. It will enable us to give a home to about fifty working women who desire to live as cheaply and as comfortably as possible, and at the same time under the most pleasant of conditions."

"Mrs. Merrivether has had considerable experience in matters of this kind and will, I am sure, make an excellent manager for the hotel. We have altered the old Anderson residence to suit our purposes and I do not believe that there is a place in the city which is better adapted to such uses. It is very comfortable and is close to the city."

"We want to make the girls feel that they are at home and that all the restraints and influences of home life are thrown around them."

NEW SMACK FOR WARREN & CO. REACHES HERE. A fine new smack, constructed at Bagdad for Warren & Co., reached the city Friday, and is now moored at the company's wharf, where the finishing touches will be placed on her.

The vessel is of the same model as those recently built at Bagdad for this firm. During recent years this firm has purchased no vessels in the east for its fishing fleet, but has had them built at Bagdad, the work being done by home men and native timbers used.

The firm finds that vessels built here give better service, last longer and are generally much better schooners for this class of business than those built in the east.

The company only recently launched a new smack and the one which was towed over Friday is built along the same lines. As yet the vessel has not been named or measured.

DR. LEE D'FOREST LEAVES FOR NEW YORK

Where He Will Test the Immense Station Recently Completed at Manhattan Beach.

Dr. Lee deForest, the famous wireless telegraph inventor, who has been in Pensacola for over a month, left yesterday at noon for New York.

Dr. deForest had considerable trouble in getting the local wireless station in condition to transmit and receive messages from Key West, owing to the fact that the masts were not of sufficient height, and also that the peculiar dryness of the sand did not attract the electricity as in other places. This was finally rectified, but not until the doctor had spent more than a month in experimenting to ascertain the cause of the trouble.

When Dr. deForest reaches New York he will proceed at once to Manhattan Beach, where he will test the immense station at that place, which is one of the largest ever placed in operation by the company. This station is supposed to speak with Havana, Cuba, and has just been completed and is ready for a test. Later it will also be used in trans-Atlantic business. At least that is the intention of Dr. deForest at present.

The station at the Pensacola navy yard can now speak with Key West, Panama, New Orleans and other points. It has been accepted by the government, and official business is now being sent through.
