SURVEY OF THE EVERGLADES COMPLETED

Preliminary Work Gives Assurance that Drainage Plan Will Be a Success.

The last issue of the Ft. Pierce Tribune contained the following relative to the preliminary survey for drainage of the Everglades:

The preliminary survey in the great project to drain the Everglades has been completed, and Surveyor J. O. Fries is now enroute to Tallahassee to present his report to the governor, and other members of the state internal improvement fund commissioners.

Mr. Fries, in company with Jack Keen, W. M. Meredith, "Bud" Raulerson, Tom Lee and Morgan Swain as assistants, and Milledge Raulerson and Will Cubbage as teamsters, left Fort Pierce on August 18, to commence this work, going from here to White City, where they crossed the St. Lucie river, and followed down the north fork until they reached Winters' creek, which is four miles from Stuart-on-the-St. Lucie. At this point the survey was commenced, and all the territory between here and Lake Okechobee was thoroughly covered.

The survey was completed last Friday, making a total of 22 days consumed in the work, which Mr. Fries informed the Tribune was most difficult, as the entire ground covered was under water, and rain fell almost every day.

Lake Okechobee was found to be quite high, and the water level is 21 feet above the water level in the St. Lucie river, although at ordinary conditions the difference would be about 10 feet. The distance of the survey from Winters' creek, on the St. Lucie river to Lake Okechobee is 23 1/4 miles, which with 19 feet fall allows almost a foot to the mile, which would be most ample to successfully drain the entire Everglades.

Mr. Fries reports that starting from Winters' creek, the land has a gradual rise until the great Okechobee flats are passed, when the country is rather steep, reaching an altitude of over 40 feet above the St. Lucie river at the brow of Lake Okechobee.

While this survey is only a preliminary one, much information of great value has been collected, which will be used for future surveys, if deemed necessary, and will be a deciding factor in locating the canal.

It is the opinion of those who have assisted in this work that this is the most practical route, as the fall is greater than could be found at any other point, and as it is Governor Broward's determined purpose to accomplish the drainage of this vast territory if it is found feasible, we hope soon to record the actual commencement of operations, which will not only be of lasting benefit to the entire state by the opening up of millions of fertile acres to cultivation, but will be of even greater benefit to our own section, and especially Stuart our prosperous neighbor on the South, which we hope to see a part of St. Lucie county at no distant day.

DYSPEPSIA PATIENT LEFT BED AND WAS ARRESTED

Charles Roberts, a painter and boarder at the Commercial Hotel on East Intendencia street, was yesterday arrested by the police and placed in a room in the third story of the building. A guard was placed over him to prevent him leaving the place.

Roberts had been sick and Dr. Renshaw was summoned. The case was reported as a suspicious one, and it was ordered that the patient remain in bed. Later it was pronounced yellow fever.

Instead of doing so Roberts dressed himself and proceeded down stairs, and it is said, out upon the streets. This was learned within a few minutes and the police were ordered to arrest him. Roberts was found in the hotel, and was taken to a room on the third floor and ordered to remain there. A guard was placed over him to see that he did not again leave his room.

BALDWIN COURT HOUSE MUDDLE

SHERIFF UNBOSOMS HIMSELF REGARDING CONFLICT OF AUTHORITY IN ALABAMA COUNTY.

The Mobile Register of yesterday says:

On the day following Circuit Judge Browne's letter to Sheriff Armstrong of Baldwin county, ordering him to prepare for holding court at Daphne in October, the sheriff was in Mobile and would make no statement to the newspapers except that he would perform his duty under orders. However, in Montgomery Sheriff Armstrong unbosomed himself to the Advertiser as follows:

"The question is in a bad muddle for this reason: The probate judge has secured the advice of Hon. R. H. Clarke of Mobile in regard to where the county court should be held. Mr. Clarke gave a written opinion in which he said the county court should be held at Bay Minette and the circuit court also, until the supreme court shall have decided otherwise. In view of this decision of such a careful and conscientious man as Probate Judge J. H. H. Smith, on the advice of such an able attorney as Mr. Clarke, I do not see why I should take any action in the matter, because if I move the records of my office to Daphne I could not attend county court. I would like to obey both judges, but when one orders court in Daphne and the other in Bay Minette I cannot do so."

Sheriff Armstrong said there were several barriers in the way of holding court in Daphne, the first of which was that he did not have the custody of the county property at Daphne, it having been placed in the custody of another party by an order of the county commissioners. Another drawback is that he has no authority to contract to expend the money of the county for such purposes except on the order of the county commissioners. He says he has written a letter to each of the commissioners asking what they intend to do in the premises, but has not yet received a reply from any of them.

An interesting phase of the situation is a contest for the office of coroner, the two factions of the county believing that if the sheriff is disqualified the coroner would hold the balance of power.

For several years Baldwin county has been without a coroner. Recently E. Q. Norton, leader of the Daphne forces, applied to Governor Jelks for appointment to the place. The Bay Minette people learned of this move on the part of their Daphne friends and A. D. McPhail of Bay Minette was groomed and sent out upon the tracks to contest with Mr. Norton for the office of coroner.

Governor Jelks effectually disposed of the race for coroner of Baldwin by announcing that he would not appoint any one to the vacancy until the court house matter was adjudged finally.

A Criticism by List.
A story of List recites that on a certain occasion a Miss M. was playing a sonata by Sterndale Bennett, a work of a very prosy type and certainly lacking in anything like spontaneity or poetry. List was evidently not familiar with it, so, after playing some six or seven pages, he gently tapped Miss M. on the arm and said, "Mademoiselle, would you kindly name the piece you are performing?" "Certainly, sir," she replied. "It is the sonata 'The Maid of Orleans,' by William Sterndale Bennett." "Ifm," said List. "It's a pity the original manuscript didn't meet the same fate as the 'maid.'"

Cromwell and Christmas.
During the commonwealth in England, when puritanical feeling held sway, many determined efforts were made to put down what were termed superstitious festivals and among these that of Christmas day. The holly and the mistletoe bough were to be cut up root and branch as plants of the evil one. Cakes and ale were held to be impious offerings to superstition. Thus in 1647 the Cromwell party ordered throughout the country by the mouth of the common crier that Christmas should no longer be observed.

PORTLAND DAY AT THE FAIR

SEPTEMBER 30 WILL BE CELEBRATED AS HOME CITY DAY AT LEWIS AND CLARK EXPOSITION.

Portland, Ore., Sept. 19.—Preparations are being made by the department of special events of the Lewis and Clark Exposition for the biggest celebration yet held at the fair, on the occasion of Portland Day, Saturday, September 30. It is expected that the attendance on that day will break all records, exceeding even the 53,708 admissions which were recorded by the turnstiles on the Fourth of July. The date, September 30, is considered especially fortunate, following immediately upon the close of the stock show, which will be held from the 19th to the 29th inclusive, so that those who come to the fair especially to see the five stock exhibition may stay over to participate in the greatest day of the fair.

A majority of the stores of Portland and other business houses are expected to close, in order to give employees an opportunity to attend the celebration, and all Portland will turn out, swelling the crowd from Pacific Coast towns. The day of the home city at an Exposition always has been its best day. At Chicago the average attendance of 761,942 was rolled up. At St. Louis it was 404,450 at Buffalo, 162,424, and at Omaha, 98,845. While each of these cities exceeds in population that of the Exposition city of 1905, it is predicted that the attendance on Portland day will reach 60,000, while some estimates even place it at 100,000.

Benbow and His Messmate.
When the brave Admiral Benbow was a common sailor his messmate, who was stationed with him at the same gun, lost his leg by a cannon shot. The poor fellow called to his friend Benbow, who took him upon his shoulder and descended with him to the cockpit, but it happened that just as the poor fellow's head came upon a level with the deck another ball carried that off also. Benbow, however, knew nothing of the matter and carried the body down to the surgeon, calling out to the latter that he had brought a patient, desiring some one to bear a hand. The surgeon turned about and exclaimed:

Malay Literature.
The Malay tribes possess but little in the way of literature, the greater part, like that of Java, consisting of romances known under the Sanskrit name of "chakras," or the Arabic one of "shikayat." Their subjects are taken from the Hindoo epics, from the local legends of Java, from the Mohammedan tales from Arabia and from the stories of Malay princes, hardly less fabulous. Such compositions differ from those of the Javanese in that the greater number of them are in prose. The Malays are possessed of no ancient manuscripts or inscriptions on stone or brass. Their whole literature, all in the Arabic character, is certainly not of greater antiquity than their conversion to the Mohammedan religion, the earliest recorded specimen of it being the vocabulary of the Italian Pizzafetta, collected in the Moluccas in 1521.


LOCAL SITUATION MUCH IMPROVED

night no reply had been received by Dr. Porter. It is possible that Surgeon Banks has received some word from Washington, but if so he did not communicated with the state health officer. It is anticipated, however, that the camp will be ready to receive refugees during the latter portion of the week. At present 156 persons have registered at the State Board of Health headquarters, and as the camp can only accommodate one hundred, the fifty-six will have to wait until the first one hundred have departed before they will have an opportunity of entering the place.

As the fever seems to be diminishing, it is very possible that many who intimated leaving will remain here, and the camp will not be so crowded as expected.


