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HUNDREDS SHOT DOWN BY RUSSIAN TROOPS

Riot and Bloodshed Marks Day in Cities of European Russia.

FEAR A MASSACRE

Of Jews in Odessa Where Situation is Desperate.

MANY POLITICAL PRISONERS RELEASED UPON DEMAND OF MOBS WHO THREATEN TO STORM BASTILES--WHOLESALE ANARCHY PROBABLE UNLESS RIOTING IS CHECKED--MANY CITIES IN REVOLT.

Warsaw, Nov. 1.—Twenty persons were killed and nearly one hundred wounded in encounters to-night between mobs and troops.

At ten o'clock, a crowd gathered before the town hall and demanded the release of political prisoners.

HUNDREDS OF PEOPLE KILLED OR WOUNDED

Odessa, Nov. 1.—There was firing all of last night in the outskirts of town resulting in the killing or wounding of hundreds of persons.

A mob composed of thousands took possession of the principal streets and it is feared that everything has been looted.

The greatest animosity is displayed against the Jews.

It is reported that the secret police are inciting the mobs, and conflicts between the Cossacks and Students continue.

During the fighting between rougns and Jews in Dalitskaya street last night 37 persons were killed and 81 seriously injured.

SITUATION AT ODESSA CONSIDERED DESPERATE

London, Nov. 1.—A dispatch to the Evening Standard from Odessa attributes to-day's outbreaks there, of the rowdy element, to the instigation of disbanded and disarmed police.

Private dispatches depict the situation at Odessa as being worse than before the imperial manifesto was issued.

GOVERNOR COMPELLED TO OPEN PRISON DOORS

Ekaterrinoslava, Russia, Nov. 1.—The governor yesterday was compelled, at the dictation of a mob, to open the doors of the prison.

ONLY TWO CASES OF FEVER ON WEDNESDAY

Patients Who are Still Under Treatment are All Convalescent.

ONLY THE QUESTION OF A SHORT TIME UNTIL FEVER WILL BE ENTIRELY ERADICATED—MISSISSIPPI HAS RAISED QUARANTINE.

Only two new cases of yellow fever were reported last night at the State Board of Health headquarters. No deaths occurred during this period, and as a consequence the officials and physicians are much encouraged over the condition of the city.
