BOARD OF SAFETY IN REGULAR SESSION

Interesting Report Submitted by Mayor on the Feeding of Prisoners.

A regular meeting of the Board of Public Safety was held yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock, when numerous matters pertaining to that department were considered.

The board decided to purchase the horse for the fire department, which has been on trial. Two others will be examined Friday by the board with a view of being purchased.

The application of Frank Ward for a position on the police force, was referred to the marshal.

The Feed of Prisoners. The feeding of city prisoners by the city, instead of by contract, was then discussed, Mayor Bliss submitting the following interesting report upon the cost of same for the first month:

Pensacola, Fla., Nov. 1st, 1935. To The Honorable Board of Public Safety, City of Pensacola.

Gentlemen:—In accordance with the decision of your honorable Board, the city began feeding the city prisoners on the first of October, instead of letting it out by contract as heretofore. It was believed by your honorable board that the city could feed the prisoners better and cheaper than by contract, and this belief has been justified by the first month's expenses.

Formerly much complaint regarding both the quality and quantity of the prison food, but all efforts at a remedy proved futile. Certain officials who examined the food declared their dogs would not eat it. The same menu was furnished daily with a slight variation, once or twice a week. As many of these prisoners had to perform hard work upon the streets it was justly considered injurious to furnish them no better food.

Preparatory to beginning to feed the prisoners, I had a room in the woman's old prison fixed up for a kitchen at a cost of less than \$10.00, including sink and rough tables. I purchased a range and cooking utensils and necessary kitchen furniture and fixtures for \$26.75. With the consent of your honorable acting chairman I engaged an experienced cook at \$50.00 a month. During the month the grocery bill has been \$45.86; meat bill \$5.81; bread bill \$3.75; making a total of edibles \$55.42.

The council in the yearly budget allowed the Board \$175.00 a month for feeding prisoners, which, very likely, would have been the contract price had it been let by contract. The provisions cost \$55.42 and the salary of the cook \$30.00 making a total of \$85.42 and a saving of \$89.58 over the budget allowance, and a saving of \$64.58 over the contract price of last year.

Another interesting showing is that after paying out of our allowance of \$175.00 for food and for cook we pay \$36.75 for range, utensils and kitchen furniture and \$10.00 for repairs to kitchen, and after paying for all these things there is still saved \$42.83.

I desire to say to the Board that good wholesome food has been furnished, and it has been prepared in a clean and excellent condition by a capable chef, and a daily change of menu has been made. The menu comprises fresh bread, corn bread, fresh meat, fish chowder, fish balls, potatoes, onions, white beans, black eyed peas, rice, grits, tea and coffee, with brown sugar. The marshal declares there is no comparison to be made in regard to former service under contract.

The Board is to be congratulated at this most excellent showing, and upon the good business sense exhibited in the undertaking.
